Divine Origin of Church.

"The divine origen and mission of the hurch." was the subject of Father Robert's sermon at the Catholic church Sunday. The text was Luke, 10:16; "He that heareth you, heareth me; and he that despiseth you, despiseth me. And he that despiseth me, despiseth him that sent me.

In substance Father Robert said: In the Gospels we read constantly of miracles performed by Our Lord for the welfare of the people. These miracles had in view not merely the temporal benefit of mankind, but also their spiritual benefit. They were corroborative of his statement that he was the Son of Qod.

The working of miracles is no longer necessary to establish the divinity of Our Lord, for the ordinary means are suffiwhole world.

Holy Scriptures are inspired but are not the sole rule of faith. Up to the time of Moses there was no Scripture. Adam received a direct revelation from God and this and subsequent revelations were transmitted by tradition to the people down to the time of Moses. However, after the five books of Moses were give n to the world they did not become the only rule of faith among Jews. Belief in the immortality of the soul and in a future state of rewards and punishments was taught by the Jewish priests as a part of their religion, and was accepted by the people of Judea; yet the Books of Moses do not refer with clearness to such future state.

Our Lord taught orally only: so did Shop the apostles at first. Thousands acceptep the truths of Christianity and were admitted into the church before a word General Blacksmithing, HORSE. of the New Testament was written.


