### Watterson and The Railroads.

Railways should be reached and regulated through the Interstate Commerce commission; but this to be limited to the supervision of their capitalization and their relation to the general public, striking down the possibilty of discrimination and excesses, either as to passengers or shippers. The Railways are the property of the people. Their managers should be made to obey the law. .. Public Ownership is a mirage. Louisvile Courier-Journal

The real issue is one of management; of operation. Those who CPERATION of railroads are usualmen-correctly, too, for usage justifies it. But the only dispute between them and those who favor the present system is in regard to the extent of interference with the management of the roads.

When Watterson says the people own the railroads he speaks technically when he says public ownership is a mirage, he is speaking in the ordinary sense. This sliding from one meaning of a word to another is confusing to his readers, and it probably confused Henry himself.

It, primarily, the railroad industry is a public business; as Watterson says, and the courts affirm, and most economists agree; then the talk about government operation being socialistic is nonsensical. It is essentially no more socialistic for the government to perform exclusively functions that are normally its own, than to allow individuals and corporations to perform them and then dictate to these private operators as to the details of their conduct of such business.

As a matter of fact, neither regulation nor ownership of a natural monopoly by the public is socialis tic, because it is not socialistic for the state to perform a function that lies within its normal sphere of action.

Although the majority of civilised countries have found regulation ineffective, we still hope that it may prove satisfactory here. If not, and we have to adopt government ownership of the physical property of the roads, we can pay for them without bankruptcy, and conduct them without resorting to socialism.




