NOT TOO BAD

More Than 100 Per Cent Profit
In Ten Days In

SILVER PEAK RESCUE STOCK

The merging of the Silver Peak Rescue Co. with the Consolidated Nevada Mines Syndicate has been effected and those who were formerly shareholders in the first named company are holders instead of an equal number of shares in the Consolidated. As stated in the Advocate two weeks ago, the shareholders, in the Silver Peak were given the option of selling their stock at twenty-five cents a share, cash, or exchanging it for Consolidated stock with a par value and a market value of twenty-five cents a share. This meant a clear profit of 100 per cent on money invested within ten days after the purchase money was paid over for the stock, a profit of 350 per cent per annum which beats raising corn in Kansas. The promises made having all more than panned out and the Consolidated having more than 2000 acres with many paying mines, while the Silver Peak had only 60 acres of prospect; the shareholders (who had been consulted in regard to the transfer) very wisely decided that it was better to let the money stay where it was adding a little to the principal. However, if any of them should take stage fright at the size of the profit and should therefore feel any premonitory symptoms of the congealed pedal, they can dispose of their stock to the gentlemen who organized the company at a neat little margin over the par value of the Consolidated.

Harry H. Burt, president and general manager of the Aetna Exploration Co., came in from Goldfield Monday night. He brought samples of ore from several of the mines, all of which are assaying splendidly. The organizers of the Aetna Exploration Co. are to be congratulated upon their good fortune in locating so valuable a proposition; a good fortune which resulted from sound judgment, correct business principles, and in a measure from the confidence reposed in said organizers by those who know them best.

Is Co-operative, that is, the students furnish as a common fund. It is spent in their own interest. "They pay for nothing they do not get and all they pay for." An exact account of expenses and any money not spent is returned, promptly, to the students.

To secure this year's crops the threshing Co. shows old of oats about fifty about fifty regard to be produced at 1 cent per lb., the price paid one acre 2 cts. per lb., it goes to the student at that price. This rule is observed throughout. Thus good boarding is cheap.

I will not make money from the Boarding Department of a school; and I shall do all in my power to reduce the largest expense attending life at school. By this means it becomes possible for many to attend boarding school who could not otherwise attend. It were folly to give 10 ct. or 15 ct. per lb. for meat or lard, if the goods of same quality can be had 50 per cent cheaper. Under our plan this can be done.

TUITION FEES

Belong to the teachers. They do the teaching and for this, but for nothing else, they must be paid; and they must be well paid. Therefore the tuition fees must be liberal.

DOMESTIC HELP

Is an item that comes in Boarding Department. Good cooks commands good wages. The students, of course, pay the wages. So of fuel, wear and tear of furniture, etc. But the school is to have no profit from this Department.

EXCHANGE OF VALUES

The teacher has values that the parents want for his child, viz., school facilities,—instruction, care discipline, etc; and for these the parents are willing to pay money. It is often the case that parents who live near the school have values that the teacher needs, such as farm products, live stock, etc. In such cases an exchange of these surplus values is quite convenient. The other day a gentleman said I do not know that I shall have any money, but I shall have corn and other products. I replied, all right I shall need such things. So let us thus help one another.

Jessie May Denning Thomas

Mrs. Jessie May Denning Thomas, age twenty years, died Monday morning at 1:30 at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Denning, at the corner of Pennsylvania avenue and Fourth street. Her death was caused by lung trouble, hastened by an attack of malarial fever which came several months ago when she moved to Texas from the Pecos Valley. Several weeks ago she was brought home, but has long been in a critical condition and her life was despaired of many days ago. The end came as a relief to her long suffering, and takes her to the reward that awaits the pure and noble, loving and kind.

Jessie May Denning was born at Mexia, Tex., Feb. 24, 1887. She came to Roswell with her mother and brothers April 1, 1900, joining Mr. Denning who had come a month before. This has been her home since, but she spent much of her time away, having received her higher education, after leaving the Roswell High School, in Simmons College, at Abilene, Tex., where she won distinction in her studies, and at Trinity University, at Waxahachie, Tex. On the ninth of last October she was married to Dr. Chas. Thomas, who also was a native of Mexia, was then located at Artesia and is now practicing medicine at Ballinger, Texas. It was at Ballinger that Mrs. Thomas took down with malarial fever and from where she was brought to Roswell.

Thus has her young life been spent; and while here she had won the affection of a great many Roswell people, all of whom feel the deepest sorrow over her death and kindest sympathy for the relatives. She was a devout member of the Baptist church from childhood and a devout Christian all her life.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 from the home, Rev. H. F. Vermillion in charge, assisted by Elder C. C. Hill. Burial will be made in the South Side cemetery.—Roswell Record, August 26.

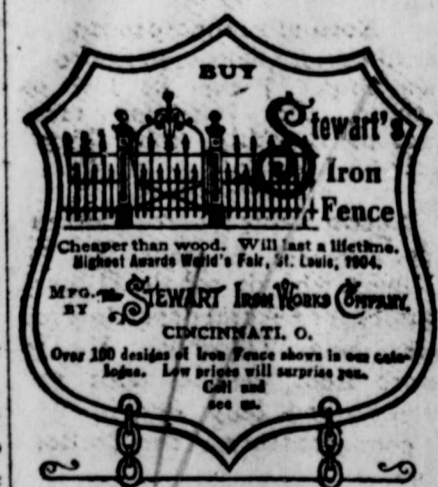

Sec. 5. Any person or persons who shall violate this ordinance or any part thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the Town jail not more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the case.

TOOTHBRUSH AS A FAD

Was Considered an Article of Luxury in Early Days.

Colonial diaries and letters make it plain that our unfortunate ancestors suffered much from jumping toothaches, swelled faces and the early loss by forcible extraction of teeth which at a later period might have been saved to render their owners many years of further service, says the Youth's Companion. No wonder, since the care of the teeth was little understood, and that little often but negligently practiced. Toothpicks were known; the toothbrush was not, although rough substitutes were employed, made of flattened sticks, split and pounded at one end to a stiff, fibrous fringe. Toothbrushes, when first introduced, were regarded as by no means important accessories to the toilet, but rather as minor luxuries, and suitable for women only. The diary of a London merchant trading to the colonies has this entry: "Bought a toothbrush for my wife, which, used together with salte water, very strong, and a washe of herbs, she is told will keep her Teethe from falling out or getting hallowe.
