He declares she has wonderful talent, has received perfect training, and will become a great concert pianist, practice too much. Mr. Paderewsk and his wife were charmed with this gifted young girl and the visit was a happy aside from the discussion and criticism of her musical ability.
Miss Norfleet is only sixteen years old-being at that winsome stage of life which the poet describes as "standing with reluctant feet, where childhood and womanhood meet." She is a pupil of Georg Kruger, director of the North Texas College Conservatory, Paderewski under the great master Leschetizky. She will graduate in May. Miss Nor-
fleet made her musical debut last May with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, with rector. She has delighted many audiences in Sherman and her legion friends are en thusiastic over the future of that seems destined to be hers in the musical world.

The wave of prohibition which i sweeping over the country wil take in New Mexico with the rest. The man who would have predicted three years ago that Kentucky would have gone dry would have been considered mentally unbalanced yet, out of 119 counties in that state there are only four where prohibition has not gained foot hold. Prohibition is go ing to be an issue in the next campaign in New Mexico.

Jam. Chisu was 'born ci. 20, 1827 in Hardeman Co., Tennessee. His parent moved to Paris Texas in an manhood and married Miss Ada Josephine Wright Dec $21 s \mathrm{t} 1859$ then he moved to Bolivar, Denton Co, Texa where two daughters and two ons were born to them. Th eldest daughter, Mary Branch and his loviny wife died ove 32 years ago, and are buried at Bolivar Texas. After losing his loving companion, he mov ed to the old Chisum ranch at South Spring, Lincoln Co New Mexico with his two sons Wal both of Roswell; and his daughter, Mrs. Sallie L. Roberts of Artesia, moving there in 1879 where he and his two brothers, the late John S Chisum who died at Eureque Springs Kansas, on the 22nd of Dec. 1884, and was buried at Paris Texas; and Pitzer M. Chisum now of Paris Texas, lived together owning large cattle interests. They were among the earliest pioneers, Uacle John and Pitzer as every one called them came to New Mexico in 1869 with a large $t$ Bosque Grande or if Firs Sumner, now called Sunny Side.
