
## Joseph S. Highsmith.

Highsmith, one of the substantial business men of Artesia and one whom it has been the pleasure of the citizens of the town to honor with a position on the board of town trustees in the recent city election, Mr. Highsmith received all the votes cast, except his own, and has already shown enterprise and conservative judgment in looking after the interests of the communi-

Mr. Highsmith is a native of South Carolina, having been born in Sampson county in 1867. Twenty years ago he moved to the new town of Plainview, Texas, where he established himself in the nursery business. For sixteen years, Mr. Highsmith conducted a most successful nursery business there when a chance visit to the Pecos Valley convinced him that this was the ideal soil and climate for growing of fruits, and he immediately sold his real estate and business at Plainview and established what is now the Artesia Nursery. Mr. Highsmith's fondest hope have been realized—the sandy soil in this part of the valley has proven fully as rich and strong as he anticipated and the nursery has been a profitable investment all the while. From the few acres used, Mr. Highsmith sold over one hundred thousand apple trees this year and had a demand for more. Nearly every orchard planted in the valley the past year or two has been secured from this nursery.

Expert horticulturists from a distance have visited the Artesia Nursery lately, and, without exception, they agree that here is to be found the healthiest and most thrifty trees in the southwest. Many orders have been received from a distance and every customer is a satisfied one.

In addition to his horticultural pursuits, Mr. Highsmith has always taken a keen interest in the material and moral upbuilding of the Artesia Country and his services have been appreciated, as is shown by the handsome vote extended him in the April election for city dads.

#### ADVOCATE IS UPHELD.

#### Article Entitled "Another Lie Nailed" Not Libelous Says Postoffice Department.

Some weeks ago (or, to be more explicit,) on March 7, 1908 the Advocate contained a short article signed by Mr. Wm. Crandall and entitled "Another Lie Nailed," which charged in no uncertain language that one D. L. Newkirk had made a false and malicious statement regarding certain petitions coming before the old town trustees. The item was signed, as before stated, and the Advocate had nothing to say in the controversy. This paper did not say that Mr. Newkirk had made a mistatement or that he had told the truth. The dis cussion was simply between the gentlemen mentioned.

Nevertheless, Mr. Newkirk notified the postoffice officials that he was libeled thereby and had the paper withheld from circulation that week. pursuance to postal instructions, Postmaster Hamilton sent a marked copy of the item to the postoffice department at Washington for further instruction in the matter. From that time until this good hour, the Advocate has presumably stood under the in dictment, no word of either exoneration or condemnation having been received from the postoffice.

After waiting nearly two months for a reply that should have been received in ten days, the secretary of the Artesia Publishing Company employed a firm of lawyers in Wash ington to look into the matter and see why the Advocate was standing condemned indefinitely without some official ruling.

The attorneys took the matter up with the department, and the disclosures were just as surprising as they were pleasing to the Advocate.

Your letter with a copy of communication will be referred to the Third Assistant Postmaster General for his consideratoin of the postage charged on the issue of the Advocate of March 7.

Up to this time, seventy-four days later, no news of sure instruction has been handed the Advocate by the postmaster at Artesia, although the Advocate office is only three doors removed from that office.

This omission is doubtless a mere matter of neglect-and absent-mindedness is a fault to which we all fall victims occasionally.

The Advocate is disposed to forgive and forget the actions that caused us the embarrassment and drop matters. The paper has been exonerated of the charge of printing libelous matter, the question of veracity has been passed up to disinterested and unbiased authorities and all hands are happy.

The Advocate is being mailed to its subscribers at the same old rates until further notice.




