A BIG YIELD OF HAY.

Over Two Tons Per Acre is What the Artesia Farmer Rakes Up.

Mr. C. J. Bruce, who has a splendid ranch in the Cottonwood section, north of Artesia was in town after the rain Thursday and gave a flattering report of farming conditions up his way. The water that fell in the foot hills Wednesday afternoon and came on down Cottonwood irrigated nicely a forty-acre tract of alfalfa and saved him the time it takes to handle the shovel. Mr. Bruce says the yield of alfalfa cut from a certain five-acre tract of land on his ranch is nothing less than remarkable. The last of the second cutting was harvested Wednesday, and the yield for the two crops from off five acres was twenty-one tons—more than two tons per acre each cutting. At the prevailing price, eight dollars, he has received \$32 per acre already, with two or three more cuttings to come. This is another one of those true tales of prosperity that the man at a distance will cause a fable, but Jim Buck is one of the best known and most reliable farmers in the Artesia country and no one here has the temerity to tell him that his statements are untrue, for he has the hay to show for it. Any doubter at a distance can write him about it. Watered land near Mr. Buck's ranch can be bought today for less than he will get off his alfalfa this season.

A number of boys about town were arranged before Justice Swebston Tuesday morning charged with having "chunked" the Chinamen who are conducting a laundry on Fifth street, a few doors off Main. The fines amounted to \$2.50 each and a jail sentence—the latter being suspended during good behavior. The boys say they had no idea they were breaking the law, and that was probably true. Roy Bean, the eccentric Texas justice, who was "law and order west of the Pecos" at one time cleared a man for killing a celestia. He said he could find plenty of statutes making it an offense to kill a man, but no where in the law books could he find the name Chinaman mentioned.

Mr. Chase is an experienced and talented newspaper man from Texas and Mr. Whelan—well, you all know what Whelan is. We are pleased to know that the gentlemen received a warm reception from the business men and that Artesia will receive a creditable statement of facts in the big edition.

Artesiaites Marry at Roswell.

John Quincy Allen, 23, of Artesia, and Miss Myrtle May Kapphan, 18, of Lakewood, and John Weigle, 20, and Miss Vivian Woolam, 17, both of Artesia, constituted a happy double wedding party that came to Roswell from Eddy county this morning. They were chaperoned by Miss Woolam's mother, wife of Rev. Mr. Woolam, of Artesia. They secured the necessary license and will be married late this afternoon or evening. The younger couple had a little difficulty in getting their license, both being under age. The girl's mother gave her consent, but the groom was not so fortunate. Finally he secured the license by making affidavit that he would be 21 in August and stating that his parents were in Virginia and their consent would be easily secured, except that they were so far away. The district attorney approved the issue of the document, and the plans for a double wedding will proceed. The parties will return to Artesia tonight.

LARGE ALFALFA SHIPMENT.

Full Train Loaded Starts From Artesia to New Orleans Tuesday Afternoon.

The largest single shipment of hay ever made from this station left Tuesday afternoon via the Santa Fe and Rock Island for New Orleans. It consisted of twenty-eight full cars, loaded with pea-green alfalfa, and was sold by the Artesia Alfalfa Growers and Shippers Association. It had been intended by the Association that each car carry a large banner telling what it contained and where from, as an advertisement of the Artesia Country, but the railroad with which the Santa Fe had connections would not allow the banners attached and the advertising feature had to be abandoned at the last moment. The Rock Island evidently does not feel disposed to help push along the great Pecos Valley, and we can't blame the officials. They know well enough that should the immigrants from the old states once get a look at the Artesia Country they will straightway buy their tickets over the Santa Fe.

men to carry on their business any further. Mr. E. F. A SEVERE HAIL STORM.

A Number of Orchards Near Hope Lose Much Fruit by Hail Storm Tuesday.

The first rain cloud of the season to form near Artesia gathered Tuesday afternoon, and the precipitation was appreciated by all except some fruit growers near Hope. The hardest of the rain was on upper Eagle Draw, north of Hope and west of Artesia. The flood waters that fell reached Artesia the following morning, and was utilized for irrigation purposes by farmers immediately south of town. Orchards south and southwest of Hope were damaged by a considerable fall of hail. Parties from there report that several car loads of apples and other fruits were left upon the ground. The storm was not general, and the orchards north of town were not injured. It is not thought the loss will be so very extensive, as most of the trees had more fruit than the limbs would sustain, anyway, and would have had to be thinned.

The Town of Artesia, has an ordinance, we are informed, that is designed to keep the streets clean of all noxious weeds and trash. If the surmise is correct, the law is evidently emphasized more in the breach than the observance. A great deal of the newly-laid cement walks are obscured by a rank growth of weeds that would cause the most non-progressive suburbanite in Carlsbad to hang his head in shame. This is not the Artesia way of doing things, at all.

Property values are rising rapidly around Artesia these days. Last summer, the one hundred thousand dollars worth of stock of the Artesia Water, Power and Light Company was sold, we have been informed, to Mr. James Nelson for the sum of one dollar. Last week, that astute financier offered to sell the same for two thousand—it being claimed that he was owner of same and could deliver the goods. Now comes a gentleman in Texas who wants to sell one-fourth of said stock for \$25,000. Thus it will be seen that the traffic in water company stock is becoming interesting. A stock that can increase in value from one dollar to \$100,000 in less than twelve months is not bad investment on any market, and such snaps are not picked up in the west every day.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SIDEWALK LINES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico.

Sec. 1 That there is hereby levied against the owners of Lot 2 in Block 9 in the Clayton and Stegman addition to the Town of Artesia, Eddy County, New Mexico, a special tax amounting to the sum of One Hundred and Twenty four and 95-100 dollars, to pay I. R. Daniels the cost of building a sidewalk on Rose Lawn street in said Town abutting on and adjoining said lot in compliance with Ordinance No 72 of the Town of Artesia, said town having caused said sidewalk to be built by said I. R. Daniels after the owners of said lots had failed or refused to build same in compliance with said ordinance; and this levy shall be and is hereby made a lien on said lot from the 27th day of April, A. D. 1908 the date when said sidewalk was completed.

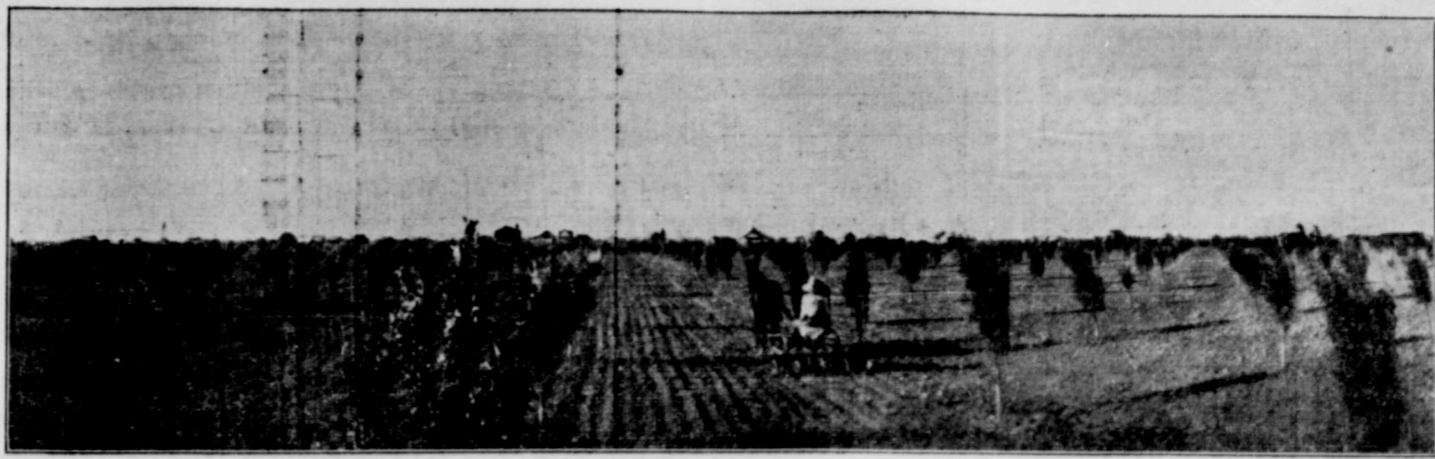

GROVER CLEVELAND IS DEAD.

Dies at Princeton, N. J., Wednesday—Heart Failure is Direct Cause.

Princeton, N. J., June 24.—Grover Cleveland, former President of the United States, died suddenly at his home here at 8:40 this morning. His death was due to heart failure complicated with other diseases. His death was not immediately announced, but was delayed until official statement had been prepared by the physician in attendance, which was as follows: "Mr. Cleveland for many years suffered from repeated attacks of gastro-intestinal origin. He also had a long standing disease of the heart and kidneys. Heart failure complicated with pulmonary trouble and oedema were the immediate causes of his death."

TO ATTEND FUNERAL.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., June 24.—President Roosevelt will not attend the Yale-Harvard boat race tomorrow, owing to the death of former President Cleveland. He sent a message of condolence to Mrs. Cleveland, and expressed the intention of attending the funeral if it takes place any other day than Saturday, when he has an important conference.

The President ordered the flags on the White House and all department buildings to be placed at half mast in memory of Mr. Cleveland. He also ordered that suitable naval and military honors be rendered on the day of the funeral.

HIS CAREER.

Grover Cleveland was the 22nd and 23rd President. He was born in Caldwell, Essex county, N. J., on March 18 1837 and was consequently 71 years old last March. In his earlier days he served as a clerk, later going to Buffalo where he became a bank clerk and where he was admitted to the bar in 1859. From this date his honors came thick and fast.

From 1863 to 1865 he was assistant district attorney and in 1870 was elected sheriff of Erie county and served until 1873. He became mayor of Buffalo in 1881 and this led to his nomination to the higher office of Governor of the state of New York.

The campaign for governor

was a strenuous one and when the smoke of the battle had cleared away it was found that Cleveland was elected by the great majority of 192,000.

By this time the attention of the country as a whole had become attracted to Cleveland and in 1884 he secured the democratic nomination to the highest office in the gift of the American people and was elected over his republican opponent, James G. Blaine. While president in this his first term he attracted much attention to the subject of tariff reform by his famous message on that subject to congress. He was nominated but was defeated in 1888 by Benj. Harrison and retired from the presidency in 1889.

The democratic party again turned to Cleveland in 1892 and he was nominated and elected over Harrison, receiving 277 electoral votes to his opponents 145 and 5,555,533 popular votes to 5,175,577 for Mr. Harrison. When his term expired in 1897 he retired to Princeton N. J., where he has since resided with his family.
