GROVER CLEVELAND IS DEAD

Dies at Princeton, N. J., Wednes
day-Heart Failure is Direct Cause.

Princeton, N. J., June 24.Grover Cleveland, former Pres ident of the United States died suddenly at his home here at 8: 40 this morning. His death was due to heart failure complicated with other diseases. His death was not
immediately announced, but immediately announced, but was delayed until official state ment had been prepared by the physician in attendance, which
was as follows: "Mr. Cleve land for many years suffered from repeated attacks of gas-tro-intestinal origin. He also had a long standing disease of the heart and kidneys Heulmonary trouble and oedema pulmonary trouble and oedema his death

Oyster Bay, N. Y., June 24 President Roosevelt will not attend the Yale-Harvard boat race tomorrow, owing to the death of former President Cleveland. He sent a message of condolence to Mrs. Cleveland, and expressed the intention of attending the funeral if it takes place any he has an important confer-

The President ordered the flags on the White House and all department buildings to be placed at half mast in memory of Mr. Cleveland. He also and military honors be rendered on the day of the funeral his career.
Grover Cleveland was the 22nd and 23rd President. He was born in Caldwell, Essex county, N. J., on March 18
1837 and was consequently 71 1837 and was consequently 71
years old last March. In. hi earlier days he served as clerk, later going to Buffalo where he became a bank clerk and where he was admitted to the bar in 1859 . From this
date his honors came thick and fast
From 1863 to 1865 he was as sistant district attorney and in in 1870 was elected sheriff o 1873 . He became mayor 1873. He became mayor of
Buffalo in 1881 and this led to his nomination to the higher office of Governor of the state

The campaign for governor
was a strenous one and when
the smoke of the battle the smoke of the battle had cleared away it was found
that Cleveland was elected by the great majority of 192,000 . By this time the attention the country as a whole had become attracted to Cleveland and in 1884 he secured the democratic nomination to the highest office in the gift of the American people and was elected over his republican opponent, James G. Blaine While president in this his first term he attracted much tariff reform by his tariff reform by his famous message on that subject to
congress. He was nominated but was defeate. 1 in 1888 by Benj. Harrison and retired from the presidency in 1889. The democratic party again turned to Cleveland in 1892 and he was nominated and elected over Harrison, receivopponents 145 and $5,555,533$ popular votes to $5,175,577$ for Mr. Harrison. When his term Mr. Harrison. 1897 he retired to Princeton N. J., where he has since resided with his family.
