By Large Majority, Citizens of Artesia Vote for New School Building

The election to determine whether or not ten thousand dollars worth of bonds should be issued with which to erect another public school building was held last Monday and proved to a one-sided affair for the friends of progress. The vote was not heavy, but positive. 133 votes were cast. Of these 127 were in favor of the issuance of the bonds and 6 against. When a similar election was held three years ago for the erection of the first school building, not a "no" vote was put in the box, and Monday's election demonstrates the fact that the army of knockers has not encroached upon the preserves of the Artesia booster. 


