## A FAR-REACHING DECISION.

Judge Popo Rules that Stockmen are Liable for Damages on Unfenced Land.

The following opinion, rendered by Judge William $H$. Pope, at Roswell, July 11, is relative to the rights of owners of unfenced fields, and the liability of owners of animals for committed depredations thereon. The opinion is clear and concise and should be read, carefully, by every farmer and stock raiser in the county.

This is an injunction suit brought by the Plaintiff to restrain the defendants, Solomon Bond, and L. P. Strayhorn, who is justice of the peace from enforcing a certain judgment for $\$ 140$ entered by the said justice of the peace, as a
result of a statutory proceedresult of a statutory proceed-
ing under chapter 73 of the laws of 1903, based upon dam age by certain cattle belonging to the plaintiff.
Upon the argument, the validity of this judgment is as sailed upon three grounds: (I) That the statutory notice provided by chapter 73 of the
laws of 1903, were not given the plaintiff prior to the entry of judgment, and that he had no notice, whatever, of the proceedings until after such judgment. (II) That the judgment is void as beyond the jurisdiction of the justice of the peace under the organic act. (III) That the whole proceedings were invalid for the reason that the land of the defendant, Bond, was not fenced, and that under the said chapter 73 of the laws of 1903 , proceedings lie only in the case of lands legally fenced

The court is of opinion that the first ground is well taken. Upon the proofs, the plaintiff had no legal notice, whatever, of this proceeding, or of any claim for damage until after judgment. Under section 1 of chapter 73, the right of the owner of the field damaged to proceed by appraisers, to be followed by a judgment of the justice of the peace based upon such a report of the said appraisers, is given only after the owner has been duly notified of the damage and has failed to proceed to satisfy it. There having been no such notice in this case, the proceeding was ab initio invalid. of this particular transaction, of this particular transaction,
the views of the court will be given on this last point.
The direct question is presented as to whether unfenced crops are within the protection of chapter 73, and whether damages to unfenced crops can be recovered in the courts of this territory. I am of pinion that both of these questions must be answered in the affirmative. Chapter 73 of
the laws of 1903 supercedes the laws of 1903 supercedes
section 144 of the Compiled Laws of 1897. This latter law provides for damages by any animals "Which shall break over, or under, or through, or which shall trespass upon the cultivated fields, or land, or lands sown in domestic grasses or clovers for hay or pasture, or orchards, or vineyard lands his section of the statute just quoted to see that damages are qllowed in two instances- are for breaking into a lawful enclosure and the other for trespassing upon certain fields, orchards and vineyards. Sec-
ion 1 of chapter 73, of the laws of 1903 , which, by operating fully on the same subject matter, superseded and repealed said section 144, provides that "The damage done to any cultivated fields sown with hards, alfalfa or other sow domestic grasses, and to all lands fenced and enclosed how required by the law of this territory, shall be paid for by the owner of the animals by the owner of the animals
committing such damage orinjury, etc. It likewise requires only a reading of this provision of law to see that damages are afforded thereby, both for in-
jury to fields sown with cer tain crops and to fenced and enclosed lands, and since damage is allowed for both, it is, of course, allowed for either. These provisions of statutes are so plain that they do not call for any interpretation and while comments upon the de lation may well be made in view of the stock interests in this section of the territory riew vist find thei proper forum for expression in gislative rather than judicia halls.
