A FAR-REACHING DECISION.

Judge Popo Rules that Stockmen are Liable for Damages on Unfenced Land.

The following opinion, ren dered by Judge William H. Pope, at Roswell, July 11, is relative to the rights of owners of unfenced fields, and the liability of owners of animals for committed depredations thereon. The opinion is clear and concise and should be read, carefully, by every farmer and stock raiser in the county.

This is an injunction suit brought by the Plaintiff to restrain the defendants, Solomon Bond, and L. P. Strayhorn, who is justice of the peace, from enforcing a certain judgment for \$140 entered by the said justice of the peace, as a result of a statutory proceeding under chapter 73 of the laws of 1903, based upon damage by certain cattle belonging to the plaintiff.
