It is not the intention of the Advocate to dilate on the bene fits of higher education, nor to take up any time in expatiat ing on the value of colleges con ducted by any of the great Christian religious denomina tions. We take it for granted that every American citizen believes in advanced education and that every orthodox Christ ian believes that the school conducted by the great religi ous bodies make for the religiand spiritual uplifting of their pupil. Nay uplifting of their pupils. Nay itter the same thing is admitted in a very ef fective way by many who, though themselves unbelievers send their children to such schools for education. So from an educational and moral point of view the building of a denominational college in any community ought to be supported by the entire Christian citizenship and by a great part of the non-Christian popula tion. But there is another viewpoint that ought to appeal to even "the heathen and the publican" and that is the tre mendous financial benefit de rived by the college town.
The Methodists of this conference are looking for a place to build a college. They look with favor on Artesia; in fact if this town will give them the assurance that she will raise $\$ 10,000$ in the event that the college is built here, it is hers for the asking and the very first item of expenditure here will not be less than $\$ 25,000$ and may amount to $\$ 75,000$. The Methodist are a powerful body. The securing of the col lege means a great school here and from a financial viewpoint such a school will mean the making of Artesia. It does seem to us that it is a pity and a shame to throw away such golden opportunity to upbuild the town Roswell is raising 100,000 for a new railroad Yet 100,000 for a new railroad. Ye this only means that Roswel will anticipate the other town a few years at most, for all the Pecos Valley towns will have roads crossing the present one before very long, but if we let the college go we shall perhaps never get another chance while if we get the college we shall get another railroad much sooner than otherwise,so we be
"killing two birds with the one stone.'
