WATER RATES ESTABLISHED.

People Must Stop Promiscuous Digging In Streets.

At two adjourned meetings, one held Saturday night and the other Monday night, the council levied the taxes, passed the water rent ordinance, appointed a city attorney, ordered the marshal to make the folks who want to sink things in the streets conform to the ordinance for such cases made and provided, and started a much needed movement to have a number of culverts put under the railroad track.

At the last Saturday night meeting, James C. Davis was appointed city attorney in the place of G. U. McCrary who recently resigned. The tax levy was made providing a levy of 1-8 of one mill for sinking fund, 1-2 of one mill for general fund and 3-4 of one mill for interest.

The councilmen then discussed the habit into which some people have fallen of digging up the street for various purposes, such as putting in scales and the like, without leave or license from the city. The council fearing that somebody in a fit of abstraction might determine to dig a celler in the street and put up a shack over it, decided to notify the marshall to enforce the ordinance providing that the prospective delvers for basis for weighing machines and etceteras must get a permit before beginning the work of excavation.

Discussion developed the fact that there is a hole in the street just south of the school house which was made for the purpose of getting dirt for filling. The presumption is that the contractor, having agreed to get dirt just, naturally assumed that he had a right to follow the line of least resistance and get it where it was handiest. The council ordered the marshall to hunt up the miscreant and make him fill the hole that he had made in the public thoroughfare. Crandall's suggestion that the city turn an artesian stream into the cavity and use the resultant lake as a public fish pond was generally accepted as a piece of legislative levity and was not acted

It developed that the owners of the old waterworks system are now willing to give a little more land with the well in order to get the city to take it off their hands, but Artesia is still

Brainard resigned from the finance committee and Crandall was appointed to take his place. The matter contained in the marshall's report which shows him paying for a telephone when, it is alleged, the city telephone franchise gives him one free, was taken up and Brainard was requested to look into the matter.

There was some talk of raising the wages of the marshall and have him take charge of the waterworks system but the the matter while spoken of approvingly was passed over until later. The city expects to get a new hook and ladder truck; the clerk has already written in regard to it.

The council has decided that it is time to have about four culverts under the railroad east of town (a wise conclusion) and the city attorney was instructee to look up the ordinance and if none of those existing fit the case, then to pass on one that will. Adjourned.

The Kuyrkendall alfalfa mill will be located behind the warehouse of the Joyce-Pruit company just south of the Buller lots and work will be rushed in order that as much of this year's crop may be utilized as possible. After Mr. Kuyrkendall had bought the machinery for his mill several of the adjoing towns approached him with flattering bonuses in the hope of inducing him to change his mind and place the mill with them. Mr. Kuyrkendall was averse to doing this but naturally would locate where the most profit was promised. This condition of affairs coming to the ears of the directors of the commercial club they determined to raise a bonus to buy a lot. They had several conferences with Mr. Kuyrkendall and offered to try to raise enough money to buy a lot costing \$600. Mr. Kuyrkendall preferred another lot valued at \$900 and told the directors that if they would raise the price of the original lot, he would pay the difference. He also agreed to take the amount in alfalfa at market price if desired. The directors got busy at once and the mill will go up in Artesia as soon as the machinery comes

It is expected that some of the meal from the mill will be on exhibition at Albuquerque during the Irrigation Congress.

(By Prof. Stephenson. Continued from last week.)

Those of you who think that the distance in this case is fatal would do well to explain how it is that country children walk so far, and do so much, and do it too under more trying circumstances than those of the town. Suppose for instance that all parents who lived over a mile from the school house were to fold their hands and say-they can not walk it and therefore can not go, well of course such a thing would be rediculous, and unheard of. Now then where is the difference between the children of the towns and cities and the country children. There is a difference. The country children are stronger and can stand more physical exercise than those of the towns, and why is it a necessary consequence? Are we to have a degenerate race because there must be cities and towns. But you may say that such is not the case and that the town children are equally as strong as those of the country, then if they are, they can do the walking act, and will do so willingly and enjoy it provided some over anxious parent does not teach them that they can not. Unfortunately as soon as a town gets off the swaddling clothes, the society act begins, and once begun it never stops until some pernicious habit or notion is established, nor must anything get in its way es pecially something that does no more than turn out good healthy bodies and well balanced minds. Let the children be taught from the first the divine injunction that "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work." But this distance question is of minor importance, and easily overcome, so I would be glad to touch lightly on the more important reason why these grounds be taken, and used for a high school, and maybe a real col lege put in as was first intended. While advancement in both subject matter and methods in educational lines has been and continues to be little less than startling, it is the concensus of opinion of all educators that we have drifted far out from the natural world, and consequently the ethical, the cultural and the moral the greatest of all, and the therefore you might say that we are a half educated race, half civilized and half savage. Located. Alfalfa Meal Plant Will Situated

BEHIND JOYCE-PRUIT STORE

People Give \$600 On Payment Of Lot.

The Kuyrkendall alfalfa mill will be located behind the warehouse of the Joyce-Pruit company just south of the Buller lots and work will be rushed in order that as much of this year's crop may be utilized as possible. After Mr. Kuyrkendall had bought the machinery for his mill several of the adjoing towns approached him with flattering bonuses in the hope of inducing him to change his mind and place the mill with them. Mr. Kuyrkendall was averse to doing this but naturally would locate where the most profit was promised. This condition of affairs coming to the ears of the directors of the commercial club they determined to raise a bonus to buy a lot. They had several conferences with Mr. Kuyrkendall and offered to try to raise enough money to buy a lot costing \$600. Mr. Kuyrkendall preferred another lot valued at \$900 and told the directors that if they would raise the price of the original lot, he would pay the difference. He also agreed to take the amount in alfalfa at market price if desired. The directors got busy at once and the mill will go up in Artesia as soon as the machinery comes




