## Bryan Campaign Funds.

The national campaign is now in progress. On the the voters will decide whethe our next president shall be Bryan or Taft. The campaign for the presidency will be in fluential in determining the political complexion of the next congress. In the resul of this campaign the people of New Mexico are vitally in terested-in fact more inter ested than the citizens of any state. The welfare of the citizens of a territory will be affected to the same extent as that of the citizens of a state by the wise or unwise de in this campaign as set forth in the respective platforms the two great political parties. In addition thereto the inter nal affairs of a territory are nal affairs of a territory are
under the direct control of the national administration. The national congress has the power to and often does legis late directly concerning the local affairs of a territory. The President appoints our gover nor and secretary. The gover nor appoints the territorial auditors, coal oil inspectors, insurance commissioner, penitentiary officials, members of the cattle and sheep sanitary board, officers and member of the mounted police, the boards of control of all public institutions, all prosecuting attorneys, and he influences in a great degree local legislation The President also appoint the judges of our supreme and district courts and these judges appoint the cour clerks, interpreters, stenogra phers and other court officials They also appoint the land commissioners referees and the jury commisioners and select all our juries. The president also appoints for the territory the federal official which are common to the states, such as attorneys, mar-
shal, postmasters and land office official. The nationa forests consisting of more than seven million acres, are con trolled by the Interior Department and a small army o supervisors and range riders. officials use their patronage for the maintenance of parti san newspapers. With all this power weilded by the party power wellded by the party of special privilege it is sur prising that our territoria
government is considered business asset by party ma nipulators and controlled by an arrogant, defiant, political trust. Under the domination of this trust our condition has become intolerable and adequate relief may only be expected by the election of democratic president and a change in the national ad ministration.
