An Ordinance In Relation To Regulating The Keeping Of Lumber Yards, And The Placing, Piling Or Selling Of Lumber, Timber, Wood And Other Combustible Material Other Combustible Material
Within The Limits Of The Within
Town.
Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico.
Section 1. That any person who may desire to establish or maintain a lumber yard within the corporate limits of the Town of Artesia, New Mexieo, shall before doing so obtain a permit therefor from the Board permit therefor from the Board
of Trustees of said town havof Trustees of said town hav-
ing first filed a written appliing first filed a written appli
cation for such permit with cation for such permit with
the clerk of said board at least wo days before the said per mit shall be issued. The said application shall describe the exact location of the proposed lumber yard and the extent of of the buildings to be erected hereon, and the materials of hercon, and the materials which the buildings are to be constuncted, and the proposed manuer of their construction.
Such permit shall be in force or one year from the time for one year
when granted.
Section. 2. No person, hie agent, employee or servant, shall place, pile or sell, cause to be placed, piled sold, within any shed, barn other building, within Town of Artesia, any lar timber, woud or othe limber, wood or othe oustible material provided in the foreg ion.

gent, employee or ser who shall violate any of provisions of this ordina shall, upon conviction, deemed guilty of a misc meanor, and fined in a sum n exceeding three hundred do jail for a term not exceeding ninety days, and every sepa rate act in violation of thi ordinance and each day tha the person so offending continues in such violation, shall constitute a new and shal offense, for which a prosecu tion and conviction may be had.
Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting or inconsistent with this ordinance, shall insofar as they conflict and are inconsisten herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.
Section 5. This ordinance
shall be published in The Ar-
tesia Advocate, a weekly news paper printed and published in said Town of Artesia, in the next ensuing issue thereof, and shall be in full force and effect from and after five days after its publication.

## Panics and Prosperity

(The panic of 1884.)
In June 1905 Hart, Schaffne \& Marx, the famous Chicag clothiers, offered a prize for the best essay on economic subject by recent graduates of the differ ent colleges and universities the United States. A board of five of the most eminent master of political econony in the coun try were selected to assign the subjects and to determine th merit of the work presented.
The prize was won by W. Jet Loucks who had passed from fellowship in the University of Chicago to an adjunct professorship of economies and politics in the Washington and Lee University. The subject which he had selected to treat was "The causes of the panic of 1893." The first paragraph of this work we now quote in full:
"During the year 1882 there was a disastrious financial pani in France. Two years later the United States experienced a sim-
ilar calamity. $O$ ut of the generilar calamity. Out of the gener-
al depression following these two events, however, there soon de veloped a reactionary movement which, year by year, up to 1899, grew stronger and more extensive in its influence. In taking up the first step therefore, in the preliminary problem of the con-
nection between the panic of 1890 and the crisis of 1893 , and going backward to trace out the causes of the panic of 1890. the starting. pcint is to be found in the United States, where thi tendency toward a revival in
trade and industry first made its trade and industry first made it ppearance.'

On the other hand, the panic disappeared two years late in 1886 when Grover Clevelan was president and the period of prosperity which then begun did not abate when he wrote his fa mōus anti-protective message of 1887, nor did it subside when the discuasion in the cougress discassion in the was before the people and the issue in doubt.
That Loucks is not mistaken i his assersions is proven by the confirmatory testimony of Theo dore E. Burtun. Here is all that he has to say about this panic:
"The crisis which occurred in May, 1884, the date of the failure of Grant \& Ward in New York. with that of the Metropolitan National Bank and other institu-
tions. The downward movement may be said to have reached its lowest point in 1886. After this there was a season of prosperity not marked throughout by the same rapid advance as after 1878 79, but which continued with some variations in activity unt
1890, and with an interruption that time, until 1893 (Crisis and Depressions p 290-91
Blackmar begins a two page discussion of this panic with the statement, "In May, 1884, the storm burst upon the business world.
Thus we see that a Republican administration may usher in a panic from which the business

years and finally does re-
