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

Hon. H. B. Fergerson, of Albuquerque, was a visitor to Alamogordo Tuesday and Wednesday on legal buisness and left for his home Wednesday evening. Mr. Fergusson has twice represented New Mexico in the congress of United States and is well known to the people of Alamogordo and Otero county, having made a number of political speeches here at various times in the past.

Commenting on the result of the delegate election, Mr. Fergusson said: "Yes we lost out on a clean hard fight, but it was a very small majority the republican candidate received, and to me it means a future democratic state. Mr. Andrews probably got one thousand votes on the strength of his statehood plea, and probably another one thousand among the new settlers who voted for him because of race ideas. When these factors are taken into consideration and the further fact that Mr. Andrews spent \$40,000 in his recent campaign, it is conclusive proof that the state of New Mexico will be democratic."-Otero County Advertiser.

The word "tariff" is usually applied to the customs duties derived by congress on anerchandise imported. Tra dition identified the word with the town of Tarifa, Spain. 
