## Adrocate Suggestions of Propose Changes in Criminal Procedure Endorsed by Lawyers

The proposition discussed in last week's Advocate relative to the justice of providing for the payment of fees to attor neys appointed by the court to defend penniless persons charged with felony or othe grave crimes in the event that such defense resulted in acguittal and providing for an appeal to a higher court at the expense of the state, created considerable interest among members of the Artesia bar and was heartily and unequivo cably endorsed by all of them

Yes, I endorse every word of it" said Judge G. U. Mc Crary, speaking of the editor ial, "it is true that the hardest fight I eversaw made in court way by an attorney who was appointed by the court to defend a poor negro and it was a very unpopular side to be on still it is only fair to the at torneys and to the impecunious client that some compensation should be provided and I endorse the idea. I also believe that where the defendant is not able to pay for the cost of an appeal and his attorney is case he ought to has a good to appeal on furnishing satisfactory proof that he is unable to bear the necessary costs incident to taking the case up."
"Good; the idea is a good one, they have such laws in some states and they ought to have them here," was the observation of Judge J. B. Atke-

Speaking of the matter Judge D. D. Temper said $\qquad$ states have statutes similar to cate suggests and I believe that we ought to adopt some system of that sort in New Mexico. In parts of Oklahoma under the formerly appointed attorneys formerly appointed attorneys whom they knew would advise men charged with grave crime to plead guilty whether they had a case or not and I was
warned on one occasion that if I continued to put up hard fights for clients whom I was appointed to defend that I would not be appointed any more. A poor person charged with crime and convicted through to have the benefit of an appeal The surgestion of the Advo cate that rich defendants often defeat justice becase eminent attorneys who defend them lay traps for the courts with view of leading them into er roneons decisions of laws is very pertinent and has frequently occurred. The poor man ought to be allowed the benefit of a fair trial according to law. The appointment of attorneys to de fend criminals without com ships on the persons appoint ed. In the states where the statute provides for the pay ment of attorneys who are pointed by the court for penni of such fee is not tingent upon the acquittal of the defendant I certainly fully enderse the
position of the Advocate. The
poor criminal is entitled to a
fair trial and to equality before the law. He equality before get the first and he certainly does not get the last under such a system as now prevails in New Mexico. I think that the ideas set forth in the Advocate article ought to be incorporated into the constitution of the new state whenever this territory is adnitted' was the comment of City $A$ torney, James C. Davis.
Judge J. G. Osburn said; heartily approve of the propo sition to provide for an appeal in criminal cases in the manner suggested in the Advocate article: that is, that the cost of the appeal in criminal case greater than misdemeanors be borne by the state where dilatory tactics are not used, and that after the case had been determined by the appellate court the cost of any motion for rehearing in such court be borne by the party making such motion. The court could be allowed to determine what would constitute dilatory what tics. With reference to the proposition to pay a fee to an attorney appointed by the court to defend a penniless defendant, contingent upon the acquittal of the defendant, I the plan much better than the one now prevailing but I do not believe it goes far enough. An attorney appointed by the court is frequently compelled to work hard for his client and to spend much time and labor in his defense and it does not seem to me just to compel him to guarantee an acquittal in rder to secure his fee. Move over, in the event that an ap peal should be allowed it might be necessary for him to leave his business and go to the capital of the state in behalf of his client at considerable expense to himself, and at the same time he might and likely and believe that he could secure a reversal; while if he failed to ecure such reversal he would have to bear the cost of all his work and travel. I think better system would be to pro vide a reasonable and moderate compensation to be determined by the court and based upon the time and expense neces

In 1842, the whigs being in majority, congress enacted

1846, a tariff law was enacted 1846, a tariff law was enacted ple of protection of that rene nue. It passed the house by a vote of 113 to 95 and the sen
ate by the casting vote of Vice President Dallas. The average rate of duty was fixed at about 25 per cent. This was lowere to about 20 per cent, by an act of 1857
In 1861 the principle of pro tection was reasserted in the Morrill act, which increased third. During the civil wa the tariff rates were repeatedly raised to meet the expenses of government and stimulate manufacture. The se rates had ceased. In 1882 a tariff had ceased. In 1882 a tariff
commission was appointed to commission was appointed to
visit different sections of the country in the interest of tariff revision. The commission recommended a reduction of 20
per cent in rates. President Cleveland in his message of
Dec. 5,1885 , recommended a
reduction of the tariff, and his message of Dec. 6, 1887 ,
was devoted exclusively to this was devoted exclusively to this topic. The Mills bill, framed
largely in accordance with the largely in accordance with the
president's views, passed the house but failed in the senate The 51st congress passed, in 1890, an act raising the duties to an average of about 48 per cent on dutiable goods. This is known as the McKinley bill The tariff act of 1894, known as the Wilson bill became law without the president' signature, with an income tax provision, which was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. In 1897 the mposes the highest rates of duty on many articles eve known in our history. This is the tariff law now in force and which it is proposed to revise by special session of congress as soon as

All of which could be easily avoided by buying Christmas goods early, and the wise shopper would have a chance to get the pick of the stock, to enjoy the the best services of the salesman, and
not be rushed and jammed around by a lot of other luna tics who have put it off to th
last minute. It would be natter of the simplest and plainest justice to the business man, who every year invest trade, though the special cal for the goods offered last but couple of weeks, and what is eft must be carried over to another year. In fairness they should have the best possible chance to sell these goods, and
that without working their that without working their
staff to death or having the goods pulled to pieces in the frenzied rush that under the present system always prevails
in the last few days before in the last few days before
Christmas. It would seem that at such a season, plain consideration of the rights of others would impel them to do their Christmas buying early, but it never does, and it is a pretty safe bet that the last rush of previous seasons will be repeated this year. Christ mas is a great time, but it needs reforming in this par icular, anyhow.
