Postal Savings Bank.

In discussing the matter of postal saving banks we do not approach the question in a partisan spirit, it is purely matter of business and it is immaterial whether it happens to be advocated by a Republican or by a Democratic administration. If it is a good measure we ought to have it; if it is not a good measure it ought to be defeated. It is not to its discredit that it has the enthusiastic support of the leaders of the Socialist party; for the Socialists support many good measures; though we might remark that the measure which would be perhaps a necessary part of a Socialistic government, (if private savings were possible under socialism, which we deny) might work out all right if it were inaugurated under such a government and yet fail under our present economic regime. At least if it had any place under a Socialistic system it would work as well as any other department; though we have never seen any general socialistic system of government proposed that did not present so many and such serious defects that its proposers were compelled to abanpublic.

The first great fault to be found with the postal saving system is that it would tend to increase the rapid central izing tendencies now in evi dence in this country. Aside from the increase of the duties and responsibilities of the government it would also tend to strengthen the great bank ing institutions in the money centers and to weaken those in the smaller cities and in the towns. Under the Carter Bill which is now pending and which is supposed to repre sent the administrations idea of what the postal saving system should be, the government, through the postoffice department is to pay two per cent interest for all deposits and the Postmaster General shall 'Deposit postal saving depository funds in national banks to be designated by him, at a rate of interest of not less than two and one-fourth per centum per annum. Such de posits shall be made in the national banks in the states and territories in which such are received, and when possible in the counties in which such funds are received, and as far as possible in the immediate vicinity of the places at which such funds are received."

The government owes one duty in regard to banks of deposit operating under national laws; the several states and territories owe a similar duty in regard to banks organized under their laws, and that is to see that they are not fraudulent institutions, and that as they operate under the laws of the respective governments of the nation or of the states, that they do what they claim to do; namely, furnish a safe means for the retention and investments of deposits. Bryan On Socialism.

A few years ago, while on his way from San Francisco to Honolulu on his tour around the world, W. J. Bryan wrote an article on "Socialism versus Individualism" from the view point of an individualist which defined the differences between the schools as accurately as i has ever been defined in a brief discussion and in which he advanced what seemed to us conclusive reasons why the in dividualist is right and his op ponents wrong. The article appeared in Harpars magazine. In a brief editorial entitled "The Growth of Socialism" in the Commoner of 'December 4 Mr. Bryan again discusses this question and his observations are so timely and pertinent that we copy the most important part of the editorial hereunder:

"The Socialist, as The Commoner views him, is an honest and earnest man, but a mis-Seeing abuses taken man. that ought to be corrected, he seeks to overturn the entire industrial system. That there is injustice in the distribution of the rewards to labor, no one can deny, and starting with this admitted injustice, with the "known abuses," which even Mr. Taft concedes, the socialist makes them the basis of his protest against individualism. The scientific socialist presents a new system which he would substitute for individualism. There is no doubt that the theory of socialism appeals to a sentiment and yet the proposed system will not stand the test of analysis or reason. The socialist is as much mistaken in seeking to destroy competition as is the parent who imagines that his child can be made stronger and better by relieving him of the struggle that has developed the father. In the careers of the sons of the rich we find one of the strongest arguments against the elimination of competition-Children fail in ambition, in energy and in both physical and mental strength when the spur of necessity is removed. This is not always true, but it is the rule rather than the exception in the homes where great wealth has had free hand

'Aside from those who are drawn to socialism by sentimental arguments, there are those who have turned to it because personal experience has embittered them against feel that the struggle is hopeless under present conditions.

But, taking conditions as we find them, the Democrrtic party stands as the only logical and intelligent champion of individualism, for it not only defends individualism, seeks to strengthen it by freeing it from the odium that the abuses tolerated by the Republican leaders have cast up-
