He says that he was aston-
ished by the soil, the wells and the intelligent and progressive people he found all
along the valley, especially in along the valley, especially in
Artesia. That town is growAng rapidly, and many new buildings are in the course of construction there. Three
ears ago a fine brick school house was erected in Artesia the cost of about $\$ 10,000$. The hown has already outgrown high school has begun. Last week the Methodists of decided to erect their new $\$ 250,000$ college at Artesia. There were several other cities in the territory that wanted the college, but the people of
Artesio got busy and put up a Artesio got busy and put up a
cash bonus of $\$ 45,000$ and ther donations in the way of land and water that made the total donation amount to about $\$ 50,000$. This indicates that the people of Artesia have plenty of confidence in their community and that they are
confident that it has a bright future.
The land around Artesia is being rapidly rought up and put under cultivation. There was a great influx of people

Section 1. That Section 2, of Ordinance Number 17, of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico entitled "Occupation Tax" be and the same is hereby amend d by adding the following hereto:
For every automobile operat ed for hire or livery purposes or for the service or use of which any pecuniary charge is made shall pay ten dollars per year. Provided that anyone desiring to take out license for three, six or nine months may do so by paying the amount which would be proportionate with the yearly charge herein provided for.

That Oscar S Coates, his heirs and assigns, is hereby granted the right and privilege to construct, ac an electric light plant, with al necessary poles, wires, lamps and guys for anchors and other necessary apparatus in said Town of Artesia, for the pur pose of laying beneath the sur face or suspending on suitable poles, on and along said streets, alleys, lanes, bridges viaducts and public grounds from time to time as he may desire, wires, cables and conduits of electricity, together with lamps, lamp fixtures and appurtenances and devices, for distributing and supplying said Town of Artesia and the inhabitants thereof with an electric current for light and power, and any and all other marposes to which electricity plied. Said rights and fran chises to continue useful and effective to the said grantee,
his heirs and assigns for a period of fifteen years.
