ENGLISH PRIEST ON SUFFRAGE.
"Not as an extremist," writes the Rev. Wilfred Carr, of Formby, England, "but as one who believes that the woman's suffrage movement contains far more elements of good than of evil, may I be allowed to supplement certain remarks of mine at a suffragette meeting recently recorded in the columns of the London Catholic Times.

What is a vote but a wish? And to register a vote, but public expression of one's wish? Is there any serious reason why woman should be debarred from the expression of her wish touching the government of her country? Nay, I see many reasons which compel me to think that, if women's wishes had fuller play, the cause of righteousness and the greater happiness of the greater number—surely the end of all good government—would be in the ascendant. I am thinking of woman's patient endurance and generous self-sacrifice, of her deep sense of virtue and religion, and, greatest of all, her maternal instinct. These, and other noble attributes, eminently qualify her to have a voice in the government of the nation as well as in that of the home. Of a truth, the mother of men

is designed by Providence to guide the destinies of her children.

I have myself been the witness of woman's work in connection with the workhouses, and I have seen the vast improvement in the lot of the poor, since the tardy concession to woman to express her wishes in the administration of the law. Nevertheless, during this time I have heard, and still hear, men asking why don't women stick to their homes or look after their husbands.

It were idle to attempt to controvert your correspondent "Foreigner," who appears unable to rise above pagan authorities and pagan ideals, and who professes to see a parity between the Theocracy of the Catholic Church and the Democracy of the modern State. If the Almighty Wisdom has excluded woman from the priesthood and the direct rule of the Church—the Supernatural Kingdom, is that any argument, or even the remotest presumption against woman's claim to have a guidance in government belonging wholly to the natural order? Has not the Almighty set his seal upon, and consecrated women to rule over Christian lands? The world has not yet forgotten Matilda of Tuscany and

others, nor is the memory of Victoria of England likely to fade from men's minds.—Denver Catholic Register.

There is no doubt that woman possesses many attributes which if exercised in the interest of political purification would result in much good. As we have said before, an elector is a public officer and before being invested with the power of office there are two things to be determined: is the person whom it is proposed to clothe with such power and responsibility competent; and will such person perform the duties of the position. As to woman's intelligence there is no question and it devolves upon her to show by an active participation in public matters that she will use the franchise if she gets it. Let the women decide the matter. Of course, Father Carr is right in saying that any analogy between woman's place in the Church and her place in the state is faulty and worthless.
