There will be a large bell placed on the old school building so that the cases of tardiness and irregular time of arrival will be largely reduced.

Since this plan was proposed by Father Herbert, the new law has been put on the back shelf, where the Sweezy bill will slumber some of these days. There is really no need for it in this application of Christian common sense.




