## Moral Issues.

A few weeks ago the reading public was somewhat surprised at an action taken by east in which that body declared for a downward revi-
sion of the tariff. About the same time a bishop of that church denounced the minions of privilege in no uncertain tones and this, too, caused narily as far as possible we believe that churchmen as
such should remain out of politics; except where some moral issue is involved and this will generally be acknowl edged, as the correct rule
But we differ from a grea many people as to what con stitutes a moral issue.
Thure has been among both the clergy and laity a ten-
dency to assume that speak dency to assume that speaklating to temperance, to some form of gambling or to the social evil could be considered haps cases ot open and vulgar bribery or of stealing of pub lic money. All these ar they do not by any mean comprise all the public ques tions that can be classed in
that catagory. The fact i that all issues have a mor as well as an economic aspect.
Some times the moral phase is involved to such a slight ex tent that it might be considered non-existant for all practical purposes, and when such is the case of churchin ence of churchmen in theal capacity is to be frowned down. But as it is moral phase of a question to be relatively small in one generation and relatively great in the
next, and when the moral side of the issue becomes pre dominent it is pretty hard to
preach any sort of practica sermon without saying some thing that in one way or
other has some bearing on the public question. In this even it is just as well to "call a spade a spade" and be done with i around the stump," Hence we commend the Episcopalian gentlemen in frankly sayin what they thought about tariff question and about the matter of privilege.
For, the tariff is now moral issue and that phase it exceeds all others and more over it is the greatest question in national politics today Fifty years ago the moral as pect of the tariff was com-
