Lastly, it is unjust to charge that Tammany is the most corrupt political institution in America. It is no more corrupt than the Philadelphia Republican machine which cooperates with the Democratic minority in that city or than, the infamous San Francisco machine. In San Francisco, Spreckles and Heney are doing what Henry George would have done had he been elected in New York: exposing the real powers behind the grafters: and they have traced the trail all the way up to the Southern Pacific Railway Company and E. H. Harrison; side partner of aforesaid Theodore Roosevelt in the New York campaign of 1904-he to whom said Roosevelt affectionately declared "you and I are practical men," in a letter written before they fell out about the terms of the agreement, and before Roosevelt called Harrimon a liar.

Everywheres all political corruption worth mentioning can be traced to the beneficiaries of privilege and everywhere the surface reformers do more harm than good by obscuring the real issue.

If the anti-Tammanyites in New York will put up a man who will strike at the root of the evil by pointing out its source; they will win a moral victory even though they do not carry the election; but if they are content with merely assailing the minor forces of evil they will exhaust themselves as usual even though they elect their ticket and the result will be a return of Tammany after a brief exile, with reformers permanently weakened by the manifest futility of their own victory.
