bill. This was a violation of a previous pledge and was altogether reprehensible: for we hate a great deal more to late its pledges than to see the Republican party

Now, about the Republican ledges: In 1888 the Republi can National platform said:
"The Republican party pledges itself to do all in its power to facilitate the admis sion of the territories of New Mexico, Wyoming, Idaho and Arizona to the enjoyment of self-government as states, such of them as are now qualified as soon as possible and the others as soon as they become so."
Isn't that a pledge to admit New Mexico "as soon as possible; for New Mexico is placed at the head of the ist, ahead of Arizona an Idaho which would have pre ceded it had the territorie been given in alphabetical or
der. Now, the platform ad mitted that some of the terri tories were fit for statehood and promised to admit these as soon as possible. Naturally the one which was taken from the place which it would oc cupy alphabetically and placed at the head of the list was the one which they intended imply was then ready. The party violated this pledge, for the Republican party captured all branches of governmen and then when it was "possible" refused statehood. That wa twentyone years ago, so not only was this territy ready from a Republican standpoint for statehood thirtythree year ago when Elkins was in, if the New Mexican correctly repre sents the opinions of the ma jority of the Republican sena tors and representatives, but
 least twentyone years accord
ing to the national platform And the Republican party ha been in absolute control has been in absolute control for
fifteen of the last twentyone fifteen of the last twentyone years and in partial control all but two years and yet it ha not given us what it admitted was our due
In 1892 the Republican na ional platform said:

Republican senator voted against it.
Now, you know that during the long thirtythree year which have elapsed since you say the Republican senators and representatives wanted to pass a statehood bill and durng the long twentyone years that have passed since the Republican national platform declared in its favor, vou have made your territorial cam paigns on the sole issue that if the people would elect your candidate for delegate you would secure them statehood
within his term. You have within his term. You have
been "embezzlers of power." Andrews promised to resign last year if he did not secur statehood, at the next session.

## Minutes of Sept Meeting of Ceme tery Association.

The Artesia Cemetery Asso ciation met in regular session in the club rooms Monday af ternoon, Sept. 6, 1909.
The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.
The treasurer reported bills amounting to $\$ 45.57$ paid since the last meeting, leaving a balance of $\$ 138.89$ in the treas ury.
Mrs. G. R. Brainard as chairman of the improvement committee reported that the laying of the water main had been completed. A man had been employed to do the street grading but owing to illness the task was not completed. However another grader was at work and it was to be hoped that this work would soon be finished.
On account of the lack of funds the committee had not done anything toward the work in the alleys.
It was moved and seconded that no more fences be erected within the cemetery grounds. After a very careful discussion of this motion it was unanimously carried.
The question of the trees and grass to be planted was next discussed but no definite action was taken on this subject as
the members wanted time for this to be considered more fully.
Mrs. C. V. Brainard chairman of the collecting tommittee reported the following lotpayments: from E. R. Gesler $\$ 15$; from Wm. Dooley ${ }^{\$ 10}$; from F. E. Turner $\$ 15$; and frym T. C. Jewell $\$ 12$; a total
of $\$ 52$ received.
Mrs. Acord was added to this committee to assist in further collections.
It was moved that the entire entertainment committee be allowed to decide on something to be given before our next meeting, as we are lacking funds for further improve ment.

Two bills were presented, one from the Kemp Lumber Co, for $\$ 11.89$ and one from the Brainard-Corbin Hdw Co., for $\$ 89.20$. These bills were ordered paid.
It was moved and carried that the lot committee attend to the placing of white lettered head-boards at the graves of those who have been moved.

Mrs. Atkeson, as president reported that the articles of incorporations had been rec'd from Santa Fe , had been sent to Carlsbad to be recorded and returned. The recorder at Carlsbad had kindly returned our fee, for which the associa tion tenders their thanks.
Mrs. Inman suggested that a rising vote of thanks be tendered Mr. J. B. Atkeson who so kindly drafted the articles of incorporation free.
There being no further business the association adjourned to meet the first Monday in October.
At the director's meeting immediately after the adjournment it was moved and carried that the motions stand as recorded in the minutes.

The opportunity for a severe test of the new act is right there as the Columbia was the depository for million and a half dollars and a million and a half dollars are

alone. Immediately upon the crash, State Bank Commissioner Young took charge of
the affairs of the institution the affairs of the institution
and the depositors generally seem to be perfectly satisfied that in the course of a few days they will receive their money dollar for dollar. Unother banks are assessed to make good the losses, and there is a marked disposition on the parts of the other banks to resist the pavment of such assessment-presuming that
the accumulation on hands is not sufficient to pay off the claim, when all the Columbia assets are put in the pot. There
is no mistakeing the fact that it is a crucial time for the new law, which has been discussed all over the country, con-
demned by the banking business and endorsed by a great number of the common people. If the law stands it can can hardly be doubted that the act will be imitated in a great
many states as soon as the various legislatures can afford it. The difference of opinion

Democratic Opposition to Constitution.
It was twenty years ago this fall that the constitutional convention of New Mexico pre pared what was said be a firstclass constitution. The Demo crats refused to have a hand in its preparation and voted against it as a party, and it was defeated at the polls. Ever since then the Demo crats of New Mexico have been clamoring for statehood, but congress has never thought it wise to give statehood to a people who would vote down a constitution for such petty reasons. As a new genera tion has grown up since that fatal error it may be that con gress will permit the territory to make another trial.-Lordsburg Liberal.
Who said that the constitution proposed in 1889 was first class? If the monopolists did, then we may infer that it was a first-class instrument for them, but not necessarily so for the people. If the people said that it was a first-class, they seem to have adopted a peculiar way of expressing their approbation. You evi dently do not know anything about the document yourself, since you cite anonymous hearsay evidence as a proof that the voters of New Mexico did wrong in rejecting it. You charge the Democrats with not participating in its con fied in refraining from taking part if the convention were "stacked" by tools of the trusts. You do not give the reasons which induced the Democrats to vote against the proposed constitution (if they did so vote) and yet you say that congress refused thereafter to give a constitution to a people who would vote one down for "such petty reasons." That is interesting, or would be if the "petty reasons" which prompted the alleged action of the Democrats were given, so that the people of he "new generation" could determine whether they were petty or not, and if so wherein they were petty.
The Liberal knows that this last excuse for the Republican failure to carry out campaign pledges is false and absurd and that it never would have been offered if the Liberal had not been hard pressed. As usual with those who try to excuse the violation of cam paign pledges, the isnorance of its readers The Liberal is very well aware The Liberal is very well awar hat the convention which drew up that constitution had no legal standing; that it was, (theoretically) called together to present a constitution to congress in the hope that such constitution would show so much wisdom that our national legislature would be impressed with the idea that we were actually competent to govern ourselves As matter of fact, this idea was purely a humbug, for congress is not usually impressed much in that way. But the chance are that the whole thing was so planned by the trusts that if $i$ were accepted; their monopo lies would be permanently pro tected.
If you deny this, and still is the duty of the people to re-
persist in charging the Demo-
crats of twenty years ago with deliberately defeating a good constitution, then it is your dutv to produce the evidence against them: if your infer anainst them: if your infer ence be correct, this you and the other Republican papers can easily do. The Albuquer-
que Journal, the leading Republican paper in the territor suggested some time ago that the constitution to which you refer might be a better document than one drawn now, and if certain elements are allowed to absolutely control the next convention, this might be true and yet it might be a poor constitution. We suggested that the Journal publish the instrument and let the peo ple see whether they thought it would be a good constitu tion for a new state. The Journal was fair enough to publish our article but did not see fit to act upon our sugges tion; and whether it read up on it and thought it would not do, or for some other reason, it has never said a word about hat constitution since.
Now, you come along and say that someone, sometime, has said that that constitution was good and that the Democrats voted against it and de feated it "for such petty rea sons" and you imply that con gress defeated every statehood bill since because of the defeat of a tentative constitution pro duced without legal warrant by an irregular body. It is evident that you have neve read that constitution. Why do you not publish the instru ment in full in your paper and show up those pesky Demo crats? If you have any confi dence in the intelligence of your readers, you will agree that if you publish the "petty reasons" which induced thos old-time Democrats to vote against it, the people would so thoroughly aroused, and their indignation against the their indignation against the Democrats would be old-time that they would defeat them that they would defeat them
wherever they raised their heads; the constitution which the Democrats defeated, if you are telling the truth, would become the fundamental law of the new state, and your personal triumph and the triumph of your party would be complete.
