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## Cotton Insect Study Held At Lubbock

When it comes to policing cotton fields for damaging insects, the chief investigating detective is Dr. Don Rummel of Lubbock's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

An entomologist, Dr. Rummel said knowledge of the destructive pests' lifestyle may be as incriminating as chemical warfare.

"To develop an effective control, we have to understand the insect," Rummel said. "We have effective chemical insecticides, but we don't want to depend strictly on them because insects can develop resistance.

"If we know how the insect operates, we may be able to find noninsecticidal control methods," he added.

Historically, the High Plains cotton production area has been considered to have minimum insect problems, Rummel noted.

Prior to the 1970's, there were sporadic outbreaks, explained the entomologist. "Generally the bollworm had a pattern of being a serious problem about every six-eight years," he said. "The majority of the farmers didn't treat at all between that time."

Rummel said recent data indicated that moth immigration from Mexico—where increased acres of corn are being planted—now is believed to be a reason for recurring bollworm problems on the High Plains.

Cooperative studies between Rummel and U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists are trying to pinpoint the extent of the attributable factors for moth immigration.

"In the late 1970's, we saw an increase in bollworms, but

## Muleshoe Wild Horse Facility Planning Celebration May 3-4

The Wild Horse Holding Facility near Muleshoe, has recently been authorized to adopt wild horses to qualified individuals, announced the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management.

To announce this new feature, Paula and Randal Carr, operators of the facility, are holding a grand opening celebration on May 3-4.

As part of this celebration, a male, two-year old, red dunn,

wild horse from Blue Wing, Nev., will be given away to the winner of a "Name the Wild Horse Contest."

All entries must meet the adoption requirements; entries meeting those requirements will then be judged on creativity and content. Each entry must include a completed application to adopt, the proposed name and a 50 word or less essay on why that name was submitted and why the applicant wants a wild horse.

The Carrs said children may enter if their parents or guardian submit the application and accept responsibility for the animal, if that entry is selected.

Qualifications include being 18 years of age, or having the parent or guardian sign, never having been convicted of inhumane treatment of animals or for violation of the Wild Horse and Burro Act or the regulations protecting the animals.

Applicants must be able to provide adequate facilities for the animals, those include an enclosed area at least 144 feet square, with a six foot high fence. The fence should be sturdy and without any protrusions that could hurt the horse. Additional details on feeding and care will be covered through the screening process.

The celebration will also include an adoption of animals from yearlings to two year olds. The adoption fee is \$125 for each animal. There will be an antique swap show, an arts and crafts fair, tours of the facility, food concessions, demonstrations of horse breaking, videos of a wild horse round-up, entertainment in the evening and previous adopters will show their animals, and interested groups and clubs will have

displays and booths. All events will take place at the Facility, located 15 miles west of Muleshoe on FM1760.

The holding facility is authorized under the Bureau of Land Management's Adopt-A-Horse and Burro Program. Recently, the facility was approved for adoption of animals in the West Texas, Eastern New Mexico area.

Other animals in the facility are shipped to various locations within Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas for placement with qualified individuals. Over 1900 wild horses are maintained at the facility.

Of her candidacy, Mrs. Cage stated: "In a very rapidly changing world it becomes more and more evident that a sound, basic education is one of the only assurances our youth have for success. They must be prepared to re-think the old ideas and move with the tide of the times.

"The reasoning processes they are taught at children will play a major part in how well they are able to adapt. As a school board member for the past three years, it has been exciting for me to take part in seeing good things happen in our Muleshoe schools. Our reaction to the recent legislation that has required some change

in our schools had been positive and forward-thinking. We have accepted the challenge to "make good, better" in our schools and we will all be the winners. I appreciate the opportunity to serve as a school trustee and the support this community has given me. A second term will give me the chance to apply what I have learned as we continue to build excellence in education.

"Born during the war years in Topeka, Kansas, I moved, with my parents to Texas as a toddler. I received all of my elementary and high school education in LaMarque, Texas, followed by a year at Bradford College in Bradford, Mass. Upon returning to Texas, I completed my degree in English and History at the University of Texas in Austin, graduating in 1965. J.D. and I married in the summer of 1965, and moved to Eagle Pass, Texas, where we were engaged in ranching. In 1967, we took our ranching interest into Central America when we purchased a ranch in Costa Rica and moved there. That was an adventure that broadened our lives tremendously and will have a life-long influence on us. Our son, Jay, was born in San Antonio and was almost two years old when we moved to Central America. Ali, our daughter, was born in Costa Rica and, perhaps, quite naturally, still has a nice sense of 'wonder-lust' about her. We feel especially fortunate to be in Muleshoe—to know the people, and this special part of our state.

"My interest in education has grown, in part, out of our children's school experiences, but also, from the fundamental fact that a strong education is a strong foundation—a foundation we can all count on."

## Commission Issues Fifteen Permits In February

Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent has announced that 15 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in February. In January, the Commission approved 13 permits.

Seven of the new permits were for gathering pipelines, five were for gas plants, and three were trunk transmission lines. Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases, while trunk lines are larger diameter lines into which smaller pipelines connect. At gas plants, natural gas is stripped of the liquid hydrocarbons usually present in gas as it is produced from a well.

In February, one operating permit was approved for a pipeline in the San Antonio area (District 1), four in Southeast Texas (District 3), one in deep South Texas (District 4), three in East Texas (District 6), one in West Central Texas (District

7B), one in the San Angelo area (District 7C), one in North Texas (District 9), and three in the Panhandle (District 10).

Gas plant lines approved: Cities Service Oil & Gas Corp., Tulsa, OK, products, four lines—two in Gregg County and one each in Gray and Wise counties; Sage Energy Co., San Antonio, gas, Wheeler County.

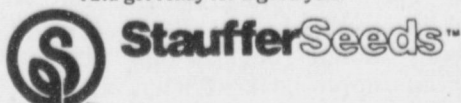

## NCO Asks Farm Program Changes

National Cotton Council has asked USDA to allow cotton producers to use both the price support loan and the optional loan deficiency payment in marketing their 1986 crop. The Council says this will result in more efficient marketing and lower government cost.

USDA had indicated earlier that growers would have to choose one or the other—not both—for their entire production.

The Council also asked a change in the world price formula so it will more accurately reflect next season's expected ocean freight costs and also will assure competitive prices for Texas and Oklahoma cottons used for coarse-count yarns. These cottons are being much more heavily discounted in the world market than U.S. loan differences indicate, the industry organization said.

## V.A. News

Q -- Why are "points" charged on VA loans?

A -- Generally, lenders require discount points (a percentage of the loan) when they consider the maximum VA interest rate to be too low to produce the yield or income that other investments would provide. The amount of discount to be paid is a matter of negotiation between the seller and the lender.

Q -- My husband died from a service-connected disability and I have not remarried. Is it possible for me to obtain a VA guaranty on a home loan?

A -- You would qualify for a certificate of eligibility to obtain a VA guaranty on a home loan. Eligibility for the actual loan would be determined by the lender.

Q -- I have been participating in the VA work study program while attending school under the GI Bill. Circumstances have forced me to withdraw from school. How can I satisfy my obligation on the remaining hours of the work study contract?

A -- You must work the remaining hours for which you received advanced payment.

added, "But, we also found that they will overwinter here."

To distinguish the difference in local and alien moths, a team of scientists have set several pheromone traps. When moths are lured into the snares, a notation is made whether the local moths have emerged from overwintering cages. From such information, Rummel said, predictions of bollworm infestation for the upcoming crop year can be made.

"If we see moths before they (local moths) emerge, we know it is immigration," the entomologist explained.

Rummel said some entomologists feel that a joint bollworm control program between Texas and Mexico might be feasible in the future. If the sources of the moths can be pinpointed and migration predicted, it might be cheaper to go to the source (Mexico) and control the worm there," he said.

Locally, the team will continue to monitor weather patterns, pheromone traps and overwintering cages at the Lubbock station. By gathering such information, he said, a precise computer program may be written within the next two years to make accurate and rapid infestation bulletins for farmers.

Rummel said that in conjunction with the prediction information, the scientists will continue researching alternate control methods along with chemical controls.

One promising area is in breeding cotton for earliness, he said, which could allow the plant to make its yield set in hard bolls before the late season infestations reach damaging levels.

With the 1986 crop, Rummel and USDA researcher Dr. J. Quisenberry will plant "fair-sized" plots of an unusually fast fruiting cotton genotype.

"A faster variety with early maturity could help us escape late season bollworm damage," he said, noting that having all of the cotton crop planted within the first few days of May could also eliminate much of the bollworm problem.

Leon Logsdon is a member of the American Heart Association; past member of the Muleshoe Jaycees; and served on the former Business Activities Committee of Muleshoe.

"I am very concerned about higher education for our children," said Logsdon.


