CARLSBAD SPRINGS.

I have noticed with a great deal of interest the organization of a company for the further exploitation of the waters of the celebrated springs at Carlsbad, from which the town took its name in fact. How it came to is another story, and has all mixed up with its personal matters on the part of the early empire builders. It is enough to say that when it seemed wise to change the name from Eddy to something became of truth a passing joke. must be shut out of schooling else, it was recollected as a happy inspiration that the analysis of the springs corresponded almost exactly with that of the celebrated Carlsbad springs in Germany, which have been the center of a great health resort for hundreds of years. Instantly the name of Carlsbad was suggested as what the doctor ordered and it was so written. Then and many times since a company undertook the boosting of the waters, only to meet with failure in the long run. Just why it should be so has always been a puzzler to me. The waters have been analyzed time and again, always with the same results, that it is almost exactly the same as the German juice which is sold all over the world, and in the microscopical difference the favor is on the side of the local stuff. There has simply been some kind of hoodoo on the project that could not be overcome. The present promoters may be able to overcome it. It is to be hoped that they will. If the springs were located anywhere else in the world, there would be a great watering resort built on the banks of the river where the waters gush forth, and people would come from the four corners for the certainty of health they contain in a very wide range of disease. While I lived in Carlsbad I studied those springs carefully, even going so far as to send a sample secretly to the professor of chemistry of one of the largest colleges in the world for analysis, just to see if the claims of similarity to the German waters was correct or merely the wild dream of a real estate syndicate. The result proved that the published estimates were correct to a grain. After that I used to recommend it to all the newcomers I could get to listen, and in case after case the results were satisfactory in the extreme. I published the remarkable results, but it didn't cause any stampede for the waters. On the other hand the company went broke and the spring caved in. Being so close to home people didn't seem to want to believe-and they didn't. 




