## More Oil Struck.

On last Saturday the Gesler well rig which was drilling for water on the land of Mr. Hammond, two and one-half miles northeast of Dayton, struck a vein of oil which proved to be the best strike yet made in the Davton field, The well is 947 feet deep and the oil sand was penetrated to a depth of about 7 feet before drilling of ab rilling was discontinued. Esof oil at from 8 to 10 barrels of oil at from 8 to 10 barrels per day. This flow is rising through water, as a small flow of water was struck at a depth of about 600 feet. This fact convinces experienced oil well men that when the water is shut off and the oil pumped it will be a very paying producer. Mr. Hammond, the owner, ives in Missouri and the drillers are now awaiting his arfival before making any further move. He has wired that he was coming and when he arrives it will be decided drilled deeper at present or the water cased off and a test water cased of and a test
made as it is. Those who have been to the well say that there appears to be some four or five times as much oil flowing out of the well as did out of the Williams well, two miles east of
town, before the water was town, before the water was cased off of it.
A number of people from other parts of the valley have been to see the new well and no small interest is manifest by many of them. There is no real excitement prevailing here but the majority of the people are glad to know that what they had been expecting is now being made a reality. Dayton Echo.

The greater this unused increment, the greater the tax is the rule.
"In Santa Fe,for instance, an enterprising, progressive citizen builds a fine mansion on a Iv increased many fold, as a penalty for his progressiveness His neighbor who has been His neighbor, who has bewn hoiding a weed lot without pave ment and without trees, finds that the value of his lot has been doubled by the building of the mansion, but his taxes are not increased in proportion under the present methods. Under the unearned increment tax, he would have in to the public treasury one-fourth to three-fourths of the unearned
value of his lot has increased eighbor's progressiveness, he pays $\$ 250$ to $\$ 750$ of that sum to the tax collector. Such a tax is a great inducement to land owners to improve their holdings. New Mexico has millions of acres that are being held idly awaiting the benefit of the unearned incre ment brought by other men who are enterprising and are building $u \rho$ the common wealth, but strange to say, those unimproved lands escape taxation almost altogether while the most logical method would be to put the burden of taxation upon such lands so as to hasten their exploitation and improvement." There is your proof that the single tax is not a political matter, for the New Mexican is the lead ing Republican paper of the erritory outside of the Pecos of common sense, and the New Mexican is certainly to oo be congratulated upon hav ing so well assimilated the lesson of the German law.
