### WESTERN COLLEGE

Work Progressing Nicely in School and Final Decorations

**NEARLY COMPLETED** 

Fine Well Brought In. Plans For Drives Around Grounds.

The school work in the different departments of the Western College is progressing satisfactorily; a new artesian well has been brought in; the grounds are about to be cleared and beautified; cement sidewalks are to be put in around the entire grounds; a splendid auto drive is planned; furniture is here for the rooms not yet furnished; the hospital room is to be furnished with all modern appliances, a present from E. B. Kemp. Such is the substance of the things the Advocate man found on his visitto the campus Tuesday.

Decorating is not yet finished and part of the metal ceiling is not yet on but will be within a week. The college looks splendid inside and outside. It would be impossible to adequately describe the institution or the things we saw in the space at our command, but we should be glad to so.

The basement of the dormatory is taken up with the kitchen, pantry and dining room. The dining room is as arge as the Methodist church in the city and can be used for all sorts of banquets. Dr. W. K. Strother, president of the linstitution, who kindly accompanied us through the buildings and over the grounds said that it is the purpose of the faculty to invite the organizations of town to hold their banquets in the college hall on important occasions and that he trusts they will feel welcome. The kitchen is absolutely fireproof, and as most fires start in the kitchen, this amounts to saying that even without the other precautions the building would be practically so. The rooms are all large and when the doors now here are put in, will all be perfectly ventilated and perfectly lighted. The auditorium will seat eight hundred people; six hundred opera chairs are now here and where the crowd warrants, two hundred other chairs will be put in. The accoustic properties are faultless.

The rooms for the students are all being furnished with modern improvements of the the best quality. The new artesian well brought in this week by Sperry & Lukins will force plenty of water to all the parts of the institution. A modern hospital room, the appliances and furniture for which has been donated by E. B. Kemp is a valuable feature.

It is planned to build walks arpund and through the grounds and a sidewalk from town will soon be put down. An auto drive will also be

laid out as soon as things can be cleaned up. It is believed that fountains will be placed between the Dormatory and the Main Building.

In the educational line every thing is uptodate and the institution expects to branch out next year. Tuition will be taken on all branches of the finer arts and sciences as rapidly as the demands warrants. Comment ought to be superfluous. Next to the unspeakable crime more men are lynched for murder than for any other offense and yet it appears that these lynchings did not have the deterrent effect which legal executions had in other lands.

The sensible thing to do is to sweep away those trifling legal technicalities which embarrass our legal system and for all offenders, an ideal inferrible from Dr. Botkin's remarks, and one urged by the Picayune in the editorial from which we have quoted,

This, in our opinion would be a greater deterrent of crime and more conducive to justice sider it the best remedy I have ever than what the El Paso Times editorially described as:

"The remarkable ferocity and fiendishness displayed by the mob at Cairo, Illinois, where even women helped to lynch a negro, whose body after being shot to pieces by five hundred bullets, his heart cut pieces and preserved as souvenirs, was burned. The lust for blood unsatisfied by this manifestation of brutality harness. And we wish to say here that we have no use for those namby-pamby reformers who would abolish all corporal punishment in the schools, and we have as little use as Dr. Botkin has for those who would abolish the theory of future punishment for the violation of the laws of God. Law without a sanction is no law at all, it is anarchy. Where anarchy exists, it is bound to be supplanted by some sort of law and that is why we have lynch law.

We believe in capital punishment if impartially enforced. We believe that it ought to be swift and sure. It is said, indeed, that it some times results in the awful injustice of executing an innocent man. 

Prof. Robert Ellis Thompson contributes an interesting paper to the literature on this subject in the last issue of the New York Freeman's Journal, which closes with this sane and sensible paragraph:

"The problem presented by the rise of anarchy and the growth of socialism cannot be solved by mere repression, and still less by punishments, which do not approve themselves to the public conscience. These parties will come to an end through the diffusion of sounder principles among the people, and through the improvement of economic conditions- A sane education and a wise direction of national economics, including the abandonment of militarism. are the specifics for this disease."-Denver Catholic Register.

#### Bridge Talk.

To the members of the Artesia Commercial Club.

Gentlemen: --- I have but little patience with a man who goes around blowing his own horn, but as regards the appointment of a bridge supervisor, I feel that I have been wilfully and intentionally wronged and I think it nothing but justice to myself that a hearing be given me.

In the first place fifty cents does not make a dollar.

It will be remembered that about three years ago, I was appointed county commissioner for District No. 2, Eddy county, N. M. by Governor Hagerman, and served a little more than two years. During that time, the people of Artesia and the surrounding country were continually trying to get the county to build a bridge over the Pecos River east of Artesia, and it now seems to be an assured fact that we are to get the bridge. It will also be remembered that at the November election in 1908, the Artesia box endorsed me for re-election as commissioner, but the election resulted in the election of Joe Graham, a man who lives 65 or 70 miles from Artesia and this same bridge which will soon be built, being of as much importance as ever, the County Commissioners requested the Commercial Club to recom mend some man to look after the construction of the bridge.

I was appointed for recommendation, so far as I know, without a single objection, and went to work with just as much interest as though I had been building the bridge for myself with my own money, and it was well understood that I was to look after this matter by all people of Artesia and the surrounding country who took any interest in the bridge.

And this fact was well known and understood by the County Commissioners of Eddy County, as they sent Engineer Strong to me when he came here January 20, 1909, to make soundings and plan for the bridge. Why was he sent to me and to no one else?

When Mr. Strong came to Artesia, he phoned me and I went for him and took him down to the Pecos River, where we worked seven days, I taking him back and forth from Artesia with my own rig and team. I also paid the hands and the hardware bill which amounted to \$92.63, out of my own money, which amount was not returned to me until October. #### Nathan Jaffa Governor.

Nathan Jaffa, of Roswell, present secretary of the Territory of New Mexico and personally one of her best citizens, will be the next governor of the territory and will be elected to the United States Senate from the "Sunshine State" next year.
