#### The Tenderfoot and Cairo Lynching

The "Tenderfoot" article this week is again upon the Cairo lynching and a marked modification of his radical ideas is manifest. This tempering down is in no way due to our comments, for owing to a delay in getting out our foreign list, they did not reach Roswell, until Tuesday morning while the "Tenderfoot" for the current issue was written Saturday night. In this issue he takes the safe and legitimate ground that lynching is the natural result of tax law enforcement and his warning that the courts should take heed to the prevalence of mob violence ought to bear good fruit. However, sad though it is, we must admit that the courts are not the only sinners in this respect. We need a general awakening in favor of law enforcement. If the people were really in earnest in securing a just and speeding trial of all offenders, they could compel the courts to be more expeditlous. We congratulate the "Tenderfoot" upon his return to a sound position from which he temporarily allowed himself to wander on account of the lynching of a negro, who richly deserved; his fate, in his native state of Illinois. What the other fellow whom the mob lynched apparently to "keep its hands in," was charged with and what he deserved we have never heard.

In view of his judicial training, his alleged knowledge of the principles of government and his asserted ability to look into the very marrow of great public questions, President Taft should not have contented himself with throwing an epithet at the Oklahoma Constitution when he spoke at Phoenix, Arizona. 


