## A NOTED VISITOR

Col. W. H. Knauss, Who Labors To Abolish Sectionalism Spends Several Days Here.

Among the many distinguished men who have visited the Pecos Valley since its discovery, there has not been one whose work is deserving of
more praise than is the laber more praise than is the labor of love to which Col. W. H.
Knauss who with his son-inKnauss who with his son-in-
law, J. T. Gamble visited Ar tesia this week, has devoted his life. A colonel of a New Jersey regiment during the
civil war, and a prominent business man afterwards, dur ing the years of which business activity he built the first street railroad in Kansas City, his attention was finally called to the feeling of bitterness to the feeling of bitterness
still smouldering between the still smouldering between the
North and South. He determined to work to obliterate it and has succeeded beyond his most sanguine expectations He has lived to see the enmity of section against section al most wholly die out.
He has written a book on the subject, and from the introduction thereof we quote the following as indicative of his modesty and his fixity of purpose.
"A chivalrous man prefers to forget the things that rankle and remember instead the deeds that thrill. With this idea ever in view, a soldier of
the Union, wounded in its dethe Union, wounded in its de
fense, seeks to tell in a sim ple and unharrowing manner the story of his Camp Military prison cemetery and the inci dents pertaining to the care of same since 1894. This story might come from someone else authors work is a part of its authors work is a part of its
history, he telle it plainly and with sincere regard for the conditions of all concerned.
"In 1868 business ralled the author to North Carolina and Virginia, at which time a friendship was formed between himself and an old ex-Conguide. By comparing notes the fact was discovered that both were wounded in the same battle-Fedricksburg. The Confederate lost a leg.
"Through a bond of friend ship then formed we mutually agreed to assist the comrades agreed to assist the comrades
