HALE ENTHUSED

Tells What He Saw In THE PECOS VALLEY

Moves Down and Invites Friends to Do Likewise.

Under the head "Ben Hale Enthuses," the Mexico, Missouri Message of November 4, published the article which appears hereunder. Mr. Hale recently purchased the Ault farm on the Cottonwood through the Artesia Land Company.

Editor Message: --- As you have so kindly requested an article from me in regard to the much talked of Pecos Valley of New Mexico I will try to tell your readers what I know about the country. Many people are wondering since my first enthusiasm wore off if I am not somewhat sick of my bargain and wishing I had not sold out in good old Audrain and bought in a new country. But a second trip out there has convinced me that I made no mistake. It looks better than ever. While we were suffering here, and our crops burning up with the long summer drouth, the Pecos Valley was green with the alfalfa waist high, making a ton and a half to the acre the third cutting and the apples were growing fat and juicy on the trees. And this is the hay that is now selling at \$14 per ton right there in the Valley, and the apples that the city people all over this country are now paying 5 cts. each for at the fruit stands.

That is the beauty of an irrigated country, no worrying about the drouth or too much wet weather. No mud, no dark, gloomy, sloppy winter days.

Now I expect to leave out romance and real estate yarns and get down to bold facts. First, as to irrigation, let me say that Government experts claim for this region the most abundant supply of water of any arid region in the West.

There are immense natural springs and there are artesian wells which nothing more or "Man From Mexico," Missouri, less than artificial springs. The strongest and best artesian wells in the world are found here. The visitors from this country who went down in September were struck dumb with astonishment on beholding these wonderful wells especially the one * * that flows over 4,000 gallons per minute and throws a four inch stream 80 feet high.

The country lays beautifully, as level as a floor, without being a newer country, the a rock or any other obstruction anywhere in sight. All you have to do is to get the water on the land and then plow. No sod to speak of. The soil is, I believe, the richest on earth, and practically inexhaustible, from 15 to 30 feet deep, very loose and easily worked, with just enough sand in it to make it work well. You dont have to be a 'clod-hopper' out there, there are no clods. After you get the water on this soil it grows the most luxuriant vegetation I have ever seen. I don't believe that such alfalfa grows anywhere else on earth, and high price when it is realized that of course is their staple crop. These figures as to the price are figured low, he says and the yield will generally run more than five tons.

Even this great conception has been what is aptly called a "frost," for the great student body as a rule will have none of it, and popular sentiment is so strong that many institutions have refused to receive offered help from such a source. Still it continues at Washington, a grave and a ponderous tribunal, capable of much good but clouded by the name of a man in whom the people have little confidence, whom they distrust.

Carnegie is now an old, albeit a vigorous man. He has built a great castle in Scotland and lives there most of the time. He has many fine homes in this country. Serene in his infinite ego, he believes himself one of the greatest friends of the masses the world has known. Occasionally he drops off a million or so for some "benefaction" and mistakes the adulation of a few for the gratitude of the many. He has even the arrogance to pose as a reformer in politics and wonders why the papers sneer at his conversion occurring only after he had gotten his. He contributes largely to religious centers also, and is a strong figure in them, not understanding or rather refusing to understand that by so doing he is daily adding to the great wall that is rearing itself between the modern churches and the masses. Serene in the possession of his millions, conceiving many things that would be of unspeakable good if coming from some one else, magnificent in his indifference to the real lesson of life and Christian precept, he is going down into the sunset with golf by day and unfounded visions by night. The real philosopher can but conclude that his life has really been wasted, that his wonderful personal successes were really not worth while, that he is unfortunate in failing to see that the love and trust of the
