If the best mode would be to submit every distinct proposition mit every distinct proposition could vote yea or nay upon it egardless of anything but it absolute propriety." (Consti

## Two Constitutioal Conventions.

The new draft of the enabling act to be introduced after the holidays in the United States Senate by Senator States Senate by Senator
Borah, of Idaho, provides for Borah, of Idaho, provides for
the holding of a second conthe holding of a second con-
stitutional convention at Santa stitutional convention at Santa
Fe in case the constitution Fe in case the constitution
drafted by the first convention is rejected. There can be no objection to this provision although it would be worth a great deal more if the first election could determine definitely what the people really wanted in the line of a consti tution. It might be wise to submit those provisions of the submit those provisions of the constitution on which there is
any doubt piecemeal for adopany doubt piecemeal for adop-
tion or rejection, so that the tion or rejection, so that the
entire document is not necesentire document is not neces-
sarily defeated because the voters object to one or more clauses of it. This much is certain, New Mexico does not want an Oklahoma constitution and the following editorial utterance of the Denver Republican is correct:

Observation of the course of events in connection with the adoption of the Oklahoma constitution and the admission of that state has not been los upon President Taft. The
effect is seen in his suggestion effect is seen in his suggestion
respecting the method in respecting the method in
which the constitution of New Mexico and Arizona should be submitted to the people in case those territories are permitted to form state governments.
"'There is little question that the freak constitution of Oklahoma, full of legislation and Bryan absurdities received its majority largely because the people wished to secure statehood under any constitution rather than risk its loss through more deliberate action.
"Recognizing this and the complications arising out of the election of state officers at the same time the vote was taken on the constitution. President Taft recommends that the constitutions be submitted to the people in the proposed new states at elections different from those at which state officers would be chosen, and that provision be chosen, and that provision be conventions in case the first conventions in case the first
constitutions submitted shall constitutions
be rejected.
be rejected.
"By this
"By this means more deliberation would be secured in framing the constitutions and also in their subsequent consideration by the people. The example of Oklahoma is one to avoid. Instead of framing a constitution full of provisions of a distinctly legislative char acter and forming no proper part of an organic law, the people of New Mexico and Ari zona should aim at simplicity end should aim at simplicity and definitness in establishing their constitutions.
That the people of those territories will have an oppor tunity to vote on state consti tutions is probable, for the passage of enabling acts at this session may be looked for with confidence."-New Mexi can.

Richard son holds up the constitution of Oklahoma as a model for the people of New Mexico to pattern after, and denounces President Taft because in his Albuquerque speech he gave us warning that the adoption people of this territory by be an effectual bar to our ad mission to the union.
While nearly all the people of New Mexico are interested in the question of how to get in, Mr. Richardson comes forward to show them a sure way out of it.-Albuqurque Journal. In the first place Judge Richardson did not hold up the Oklahoma constitution as a model, then he did not charge that President Taft said we should not adopt one like the fundamental law of Oklahoma.

## tion. (Committees Report')

six new sections are contain ed in the revised constitution which invest the legislature with power to extend to cities and villages as complete autonomy as may be consistent with the established principles of our government. There is a mandatory provision requiring ing the legislature to provide by a general law for the incorporation of villages. These right of taxation for municipal purposes and restrict the mu nicipality's powers of borrow ing money and contracting debts. Under these general laws the electors of each city
and village shall have the right to frame, adopt and amend local charters, and to enact laws and ordinances relating to matters of local con-
cern, subject to the constituiion and general laws of the state. Cities and villages are given the right to acquire, own establish and maintain, either porate limits, parks, bouleporate limits, parks, boule-
vards, cemeteries, hospitals, vards, cemeteries, hospitals,
almshouses and all works which involve the public health or safety. They are also authorized to acquire, own
and operate, either within or without the corporate limits, public utilities for supplying water, light, heat, power and transportation to the municithereof, and to sell and deliver water, heat, power and light without the corporate limits to twenty-five per cent of that furnished within the corporate limits; and to operate trans-
portation lines without the municipality within such limits as may be prescribed by law;
but the right to own or operate but the right to own or operall
transportation facilities shall not extend to any city or village of less than tw
thousand inhabitants.

The constitution contains an inhibition which expressly denies cities and villages the power to abridge the right of ectiv franchise, to loan their credit tax or assessment for othe than a public public purpose and it expressly forbids them the right to acquire any public utility or to grant any public utility franchise which is not will of the city or village, unless the same shall have firs received the affirmative vote of three-fifth of the electors voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election, and
taxpayers having the qualifi cations of male electors shal be entitled to vote. These pro visions, which constitute the substance of that part of the revised constitution relating t ities and villages, will enlarge he rights and powers of mu nicipalities and transfer the powers of legislation from the state legislature to the locali ties effected. The municipali $t y$ should be the best judge of its local needs and understand the best way to satisfy them. Cities and villages will be subject to the constitution and the general laws of the state, but will not depend upon the operate any public utility or grant any public franchise it must first obtain the approval of three-fifths of its electors who may vote on the question including women taxpayer having the qualifications of male electors. This provision will prevent a community rushing into a new enterprise without considering the re sponsibility it is assuming. On the other hand, if there is general demand for public egislature for local or specia acts to regulate their local con erns. All matters of purely ocal concern can be handled by the municipal authorities In remeving the constitutiona nhibitions against cities and villages owning and operating public utilities, safeguards have been provided to insure onservative action on the part of municipalities desiring to enter this field. Before any city or village can acquire and ownership or if any locality from an secure fair treatment tion a public service corpora tion except by going into busi ness itself, the new constitu-
tion opens the way whereby tion opens the way whereby
every municipality in the state may free itself from the unjus exactions of grasping corpora
beECHERS ANNOTATION
The foregoing provisions fo he government of cities and villages have no corresponding provisions in the constitution of 1850 . They supersede Sec . 8. Art. IV, and Secs. 13 and 14. Art. XV, so far as said sections.
The provisions berein conained are designed to mee the modern conditions affect ing municipal affairs: to au thorize through appropriate legislation that which has
heretofore been donominated 'Home Rule.
These provisions constitute a marked advance from the constitutional provisions of lages by doing away with the principle of classification and with special charters, granted and subject to amendment only by the state legislature The purpose is to invest th legislature with power to en-
act into law such broad general principles relative to organiza tion and administration as ar or may be common to all cities and all villages, each city being left to frame, adopt and amend those charter provisions which have reference to their local concerns. The transfer of powers of egislation from the state leg islature to the people of the nunicipalities or their repre sentatives necessitated the imposition of certain checks and prohibitions designed to secure conservative action on the part of those to become responsible for the future conduct of such ffairs. So far as these checks and prohibitions have formerly been in the hands of the common councils, relating to franchises, and the acquiring of public utilities they are now made subject to the vote of three-fifths of the electors of the municipalities. The powe to limit the rate of taxation and restrict the power of borrowing money and contracting debts is left to the legislature where it may be subject to such changes as may be made necessary bv changing condiThe right conferred establish certain essential in stitutions involving public health and safety and to ac quire the public utilities nam-
ed, is conceived to be in line ed, is conceived to be in line with the general privileges of home rule and one placing within the hands of municipalities, under the restrictions named, certain powers for potential competition with such corporations as from the very nature of the service re
of them are monopolies.
The power granted municipalities to sell and deliver water, heat, power and light without their corporate limits to a limited extent, is designed to prevent the duplication of plants in contiguous localities and to allow the extension of the benefits of such improvements to territory not sufficiently populous to warrant establishment of such utilities as either a public or private enterprise; while the limitations are such as to prevent
