NEW ARMORY

New Mexico National Guard. Company "C" Will Occupy Hoffman man Building Until Home is Erected.

The new armory movement has received several forward shunts this week. The old Hoffman building which was moved this week to give way to the new Sipple blocks on the corner of 4th and Main, has been located on the lot west of the Sperry & Lukins headquarters and will be occupied by the Artesia Company. The company has heretofore occupied the Echols Garage through the kindness of its proprietor, Lieutenant Charles R. Echols, but the new quarters will be more satisfactory since they will be devoted exclusively to the company needs.

This move however calls attention to the necessity for permanent quarters and we are assured by Captain John B. Enfield and Lieutenant Echols that such quarters are forthcoming. Suggestions on the Constitution.

Editor, Artesia Advocate:

Public opinion is like a melting-pot. Give it to the varied ideas and views of all the people and out of it will rise the truth and the best sense of the community.

Prospects for Statehood being bright it is right and wise that the citizens of this future commonwealth should consider the making of the fundamental law of the State. We desire a constitution that will promote its prosperity and insure to our children the blessed inheritance of liberty, and the "Advocate" is to be commended for inviting a public discussion of this matter.

State constitutions are necessarily similar in many features. Ours is a tripartite form of government, its power and authority being divided into the three branches, legislative, executive and judicial, with the duties and limitations of each clearly defined. Bills of rights, designed to safe-guard personal liberty and property rights, are written into all constitutions and are practically alike in all.

Those who make the new constitution should bear in mind that they are not making a code of laws nor writing a book of statutes, and when they have prepared the bill of rights and defined the powers delegated to each of the three branches, and imposed the proper limitations upon the exercise of power by each, they have performed the greater part of their work. There are important measures which, in the opinion of the writer, should be written into New Mexico's constitution.

First: The election of U. Senators by direct vote. ordinary citizens,-the rank and file, --- are competent to elect judges, governors, representatives and a President of the United States, why are they not capable of electing their Senators? It is doubtless possible that a spectacular man, a demagogue appealing to passions and prejudices, might be elected by a direct appeal to the voters. Such a man would rarely be returned at the expiration of his first term. Experience has demonstrated that corrupt and vicious politicians may hold their seats many years by bribing legislatures and controlling patronage. have a higher opinion of the people of New Mexico than to think for a mement that they would elect with their ballots, and re-elect, to sit in the Sen-Depew.

Second: I believe in the referendum. It is necessary that the greater part of the lawmaking power should be delegated to those selected for that purpose, but there is No reason why it should ALL be given to them. In this free country the people are their own rulers, and if their legislators neglect their duty as public servants, or are controlled by improper influences, the power should be reserved Artesia property. in the people themselves to do what the legislature has left undone, and to undo what was wrongfully done. Third: I favor a corporation commission. Railroads and other corporations are necessary to the prosperity of New Mexico. We need them to develop our wonderful resources; the investment of capital and the promotion of legtimate enterprises should be welcomed, fostered and protected.

would like to see the railway mileage in New Mexico doubled, and mines and manufactures increased. When a railroad company attends to its business as a carrier of freight and passengers it is a beneficent institution. But allow a railroad company to conspire with others to raise rates; to discriminate against a man, business or section; to disregard laws; to dabble in politics and to dictate the appointment of judges and officers and it becomes a menace to the

The purpose of a corporation commission is to see that a legitimate business is conducted in a legitimate manner. A corporation receives its life and every power it has from the State; why should not the State exercise a control over its creature?

All three of these provisions are contained in the muchabused Oklahoma constitution. The writer was a citizen of that State when the constitution was written and worked and voted for its adoption. It is not as radical or as original as some who have never read it seem to think. It was carefully prepared by an able and honest body of men. They had before them for comparison the constitutions of all the other states, and they invited sugrestions from anyone who cared to appear before their committeess.

The initiative and referendum was taken from Oregon. A number of States elect their Senators direct vote, and more will adopt that method. Several States have corporation commissions, and the United States has its Interstate Commerce Commission.

I have travelled over much of the Territory and have not found its citizens deficient either in intelligence or in moral character. I have no fears but that the constitution of New Mexico will be quite as good as the best.

An Ordinance In Relation To Plumbing And The Tapping Of Water Mains And Amending Parts of Ordinance No. 76 Of The Ordinances Of The Town Of Artesia, Eddy County, New Mexico.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Ar-

Sec. 1. That Section 4 of Ordinance No. 76 of the Ordinances of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico be amended so as to read as follows:

That, All persons desiring to tap the water main shall first file application with the Water Superintendent for a permit accompanying such application with a fee of \$10.00 which fee will cover all cost of tapping and bringing water to the \$1.00 is paid. property line on residence streets and to curb line in business streets; PROVIDED is made at a tee or a cross a fee of \$7:50 must accompany the application, Provided Also, that these prices apply only to property adjoining streets where mains are laid.
