## Ordinance No. 112.

An Ordinance In Relation To Plumbing And The Tapping Of Water Mains And Amendng Parts of Ordinance No. 76 Of The Ordinances Of The Town Of Artesia, Eddy Coun$y$, New Mexico.
Be it ordained by the Board Trustees of the Town of Ar esia.
Sec. 1. That Section 4 Ordinance No. 76 of the Ordinances of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico be amended so as to read as follows:
That, All persons desiring t ap the water main shall first le application with the Water uperintendent for a permit ccompanying such applica tion with a fee of $\$ 10,00$ which ee will cover all cost of tap ing and ping and bringing water to the treets and to.curb line in business streets; PROVIDED HOWEVER, that in case a tap is made at a tee or a cross a
fee of $\$ 7: 50$ must accompany the application, Provided A1so, that these prices apply only to property adjoining streets where mains are laid. All tapping of mains and laying of connections to the property and curb line shall be done by the water supervisor or some one under his supervision, but ditches must be dug and filled by the applicant.
The said permit shall state the owner of said lot, the plumber engaged to do the work inside the line and when said tapping has been completed and the water turned in on said lot the owner thereor shall report the same to the Water supervisor, as water date, but any such owner failing to report the day said work is completed and said water turned on shall be charged water rent from the day such permit is issued.

Many states, and New Mexico does, fix the rate for the counties, but it could hardly do so for the commonwealth, as emercencies might very easily make mandatory a wide range in the territorial rate. The
equalizers knew this, of course. The position they took was simply a pretext, without justification in fact or reason. They had to have some excuse in the face of popular clamor, and they took the first one that had a jingly sound to it, apparently not stopping to think that the people would be intelligent enough to figure it Il out for themselves. It then proceeded to take up the recom mendations of the large staff of railroad attorneys who were
present, and to fix a system of present, and to fix a system of
railroad valuations that are simply ridiculous, and a series of land valuations that puts all of the burden, practically, up-
on the man who is developing on the man who is developing
a home, and exempting the home, and exempting the big grants, the large tract own-
ers, the protected interests geners, the protectedinterests gen-
erally. The real people had absolutely no chance among a gang of wolves like that, and they got none. The attitude
of the governor and of all others except the equalizers, was that every dollar of property in
the territory should pay the same proportionate tax, reason ing that if this were done that the territorial rate, all rates for that matter, would come down ing is sound. It appealed to James Bartlett more than fifty years ago, and his plan has nd his plan has
in many states been tried out in many states.
It is simply that every dollar its actual cash value. Then the board of equalization is empowerd to make a horizontal reduction in the rate if ad visable. To do this they are
given the right to pass upon all appropriation bills and such like, and are in effect the stat financial executive committee It puts a lot of power in the hands of a few men, but since our own board has arrogated to itself a power higher than that of the legislator, the governor and everybody else, that is immaterial. In the hands of real servants of the people it would be safe, simply because if there is any reduction of the
rate, every taxpayer in the rate, every taxpayer in the
state shares in that reduction. As it now is, the equalizers fix the value to suit themselves.
Take the matter of railroad valuations. There is absolute ly no attempt to arrive at a
practical estimate of either the practical estimate of either the
cost or the value of the tines cost or the value of the lines. The rates are doubtless fixed at a sum named by the rail roads themselves, that being the only way to explain the fact that on one side of an im aginery line the same road is
worth $\$ 18,000$ a mile and on the other less than a third of that. The great tractmen seem to
have the same power of suggestion, for their acreage goes in at from 30 cents an acre up. There is no way by which the mall man can get that rate no matter what the that rate, of his land may be. All that his land may be. All that
e can do is to walk to the cough and pay on the stanard that has been fixed for im, and which is several imes more than the big fellow has to pay. In other words, the man who can least afford it must pay the heaviest tribute. This condition is not and never has been denied. The equalizers and the few who train with them take refuge in the plea that if the plan of an actual valuation was put through it would be confiscatory. It is to smile. It confiscatory. the same proportion, which is what the fair man only desires. No one has insisted that the plan be jumped up right off handle. It would take at least year to re-align the territory upon the new basis. In the meantime the legislature meets, and if any amendment toward the Bartlett plan were necessary it need only to be pointed out, and the legislaGovernor Mills, in spite of it. Governor Mills, in spite of his onviction as an enemy of hon-
st assessments, dare to veto it. If he did, it would be passed over his veto or there is a limit to which he agents of the interests may go.
