## One Cause For Postal Deficit.

The alleged fact that th postoffice department can print envelopes and sell them at a much lower price than they can be sold by private enter prise and still not lose by the
transaction, has frequently transaction, has frequently
been used as an argument by those who believe that govern mental ownership of produc tion and distribution would be cheaper for the people. Now, postoffice department has reach ed alarming proportions pub lishers are inclined to shat
lenge the truth of the above
assertion, and the dead letter office to stop
a conassertion, and to lay a con-
siderable part of the cause of shortage on the goverument's activity in this particular.
In its issue of Februgry the Publishers Auxiliary/under the heading "Favors Those Who Can Pay," shows that the printing causof a loss to
the government *and that it is directly in the Interest of the trusts at the expense of the rest of the people. It says:
"The United States post office department, in monopo listic competition with enve lope and paper maufacturers envelope and paper merchants. printers, publishers of trade printers, publishers of trade
journals and daily and weekly newspapers, and tens of thous ands of workmen employed by them, sells, free of charge for the printing, billions of so-called returned-request stamped envelopes bearing the business address of the sender.
"The use of the stamped envelope is legitimate. The free printing of the return request besides affecting directly tens of thousands of taxpaying citizens, is a palpable piece of itizens, is a palpable piece o
needless paternalism and dangerous encouragement of socialism. It is not legitimate. "The post office department during the last few years has further attempted to fasten its mouopoly upon the public by the use of selling methods which may justly be character ized as outrageous. Not only has the free use of the mail for the distribution of printed resorted to, but in numberles. instances postmasters er carriers have ters and let free, this sales-promotion literature at a loss of just so much upon the community, which does not belong to the favored
class of free-printed stamped class of free-printed stamped
envelope users.

The department has boast ed that this branch of the pos tal work, at least, does not increase the postal deficit. But figures are never shown to prove this, and careful in loss to the public on account of this free printing and free distributing printing and fre distributing amounts to hun
dreds of thousands of dollare.
reds of thousands of dollare.
"The stamped envelope is
great converience to the public; no one would do away quest. The return request, printed in blank, ought to be left exactly where it is. But the best interest of the public could not possibly be sacrificed by legislation to abolish the evil practice of making and selling the stamped envelopes without charge for the print ing.

It has been said that the abolition of this practice would increase the work of the dead etter office. Not true-but un important. The free-printed tamped envelope, as now sold, oes not reach that immense section of the public which patronizes the dead letter office. The printed return-request is beyond their reach $\cdots$ for the single reason is that they cannot buy return-request stampenvelopes, whether printed or not printed, in lots of 500 , the mallest orders which the de partment fills.
Another reason why
this practice is that the pres
ent patrons of the free-printed stamped envelope monopoly, the large corporations and business houses, would use the printed return-request anyway having "the price.
There is no doubt that a ontinuation of this government manufacturing, adver ising, transporting and mer chandising business, all at the expense of private manufac urers and merchants, increase the postal deficit, and hence, by just so much, becomes an increasing burden upon the taxpayers.
It furnishes no facility to the public, nor to any section of it, which would not be furnished just as effectively by private enterprise.

The enormous expense of tising, free tran, free adverfree merchandising, instead of being borne by that immens section of the public which does not, and under the present svstem cannot, use the re turn request, would under the abolition of the evil, be borne by those, from the biggest corporations down, who do
"Aside from the absurdity of the position itself, as a matter of economical and efficient administration, aside from the falsity of all these claims that a discontinuance of the abuse would work harm in any di rection, it is a self-evident fact that the longer this unfair and destructive practice continues the more concerned will be the man, the woman, or the child who owns a dollar's worth of

## property. or ever hopes to do

"The longer the period during which this government monopoly has a chance to fasharder will the public, the harder will that public find it
to shake it off.
"Organizations and trades comprising an individual mem-
bership of at least ten thousbership of at least ten thous-
and employers and workmen, who have all capitalized their money and their labor into ex isting private enterprises, pro test against the further con tinuance of this abuse."

Mr. Bass requested the board to reconsider the bill for elec tric lights during the months of November and December whereupon it was moved that tha is be allowed $\$ 56.00$ on prevailed.
It was moved that Messr Brainard and Crandall locate the sidewalk on the East side of Rose Lawn avenue and di rect where same shall be laid the motion receiving a second prevailed.
The clerk was instructed to have published the following: An ort rance repealing that part or ordina in section 5 refers torein same in section th prohibition of corrugated iron buildings within fire limits And an ordinance in relation to electric wiring and inspec tion to same-

## Ordinance No. 114.

Town of Artesia shall be intalled in accordance with the National Electric Code and its atest supplement or supplements issued from time to ime.
In addition to Class B, 12th of the National Electrical Code, all wires at potentials of 60 volts and above must be carried at least six feet above all other wires at all points. In addition to Class B, 12th of the National Electric Code, ross arms bearing wires at above must ether cross arms feet above all

In Class C, 21-e, omit words in plain sight" for installations in mercantile or other than residence buildings.
Section 2. The office of City Electrical Inspector is hereby created, the same to be ap pointed by the chairman of he Board of Trustees and con irmed by the Board of Trusees. He shall inspect or have inspected all wireing done in his town and shall enforce its installation in accordance with his ordinance.
Section 3. All persons desiring to do electric wiring in the Town of Artesia, shall first furnish bond to the town and ecure a contractor's license from the city clerk. Bond shall be in the sum of $\$ 1,000.00$
license fee shall be $\$ 20.00$ per cense fee shall be $\$ 20.00$ per
annum payable in advance and he city-clerk shall require written recommendation from the town Electrical Inspector hefore issuing any license.
Section 4. Any contractor de siring to install electric wiring in or on any building shall first obtain a written permit from the town inspector. Application for permit shall be on printed furnished by the town and shall contain description of wiring to be installed; this ap plication to be filed in town records. Any subsequent change in wiring, installation shall be issued for $\$ 1.00$ each to be paid to the the town in pector.
Section. 5. No repairs or ad dition shall be made to any ex isting wiring in or on build ings, except on conditions that mains and feeds to points of change or addition, also the change or addition itself shal be in accordance with this or inance. Application and per mit shall specify changes $t$ complish above.
Section 6. No instaliation shall be approved by the town inspection until same is safe guarded against undue and unsafe voltage rise by proper grounding of service wire, as recommended by the National Electrical Code.
Section 7. All persons doing electric wiring shall notify the of installation is concealed and no portion shall be con cealed without written ap cealed without written ap Section 8. No inspector. Section 8 . No service com pany or other person shall con
nect or allow to be connected nect or allow to be connecte any portion of a wiring instal proval shall have been issue by the town inspector.

Section 1. All wiring for electrical lights or appliances in or on any building, and in

Section 9. The town inspec tor shall charge for inspections of wiring in buildings, as fol lows:
1st. For installations of con cealed knob and tube first ten outlets or part, $\$ 2.00$, subse quent outlets 5 cents each
2nd. For installations of open, molding or cinduit wiring firs ten outlets or part $\$ 1.00$, sub sequent outlets $21-2$ cents eac 3rd. For installations of mo tors, minimum, $\$ 1.00$, each mo or above one 25 cents each. 4th. Forinstallations of igns or fixtures first 25 lights or fraction, $\$ 1.00$, subsequent lights 1 cent each.
5th. Minimum charge for ny inspection $\$ 1.00$
6th. For each re-inspection made necessary by faulty con struction 50 cents.
Section 10. The town inspec tor, or deputy is authorized to enter upon and examine all premises at all reasonable hours, to ascertain if the ordi nance is being complied with. Section 11. The town inspec tor is authorized to have ser vice disconnected from such wiring installations, in or on buildings and in or on streets or alleys, as may, in his judgor ant, be hazardous to proper ty or life, such wiring not to ty or life, such wiring not
be again connected , to service be again connected, to service
until brought into accordance with the requirements of this ordinance. The town inspec tor may, at his discretion, notify any owner or agent in charge of wires to have them removed, and have wiring done in accordance with thio ordinance within 30 days from from date of such notification. Section 12. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or interfering this ordinance, or interfering
with the enforcement thereof, shall be guilty of a misdeshall be guilty of a misde
meanor and shall be fined not meanor and shall be fined not
less than $\$ 25.00$ and if doing wiring shall have his license evoked by the town.
Section 13. This ordinance shall have been published one week prior to its passage in Artesia Advocate a newspaper feneral circulation published in the town of Artesia, New Mexico (there being no daily paper published in said town,) and shall be published twice in said newspaper after said passage and shall be in full force and effect from and after said last publication.

## Successful in Oklahoma.

Gutbrie, Okla., Feb. 6‥After three years of experience of the initiative and referendum, one of the most novel of the experiments in legislation put into effect by the Oklahoma constitution, the people of the fied with the results, and there is no disposition on any hand to suggest the repeal or even the material modification of it now exists.
One of the strongest proofs of its success has been the fact that it has been adopted by the very people who most strongly opposed it in the beginning, The Republican leaders in the very generally opposed, to it and denounced it as socialisti and impracticable, yet the Re publican state committee has
made use of the referendum to obtain a popular vote upon the ribbon ballot general election law passed by the last legislature, which gives the control of all of the election machinery of the state to the party in control of the state administration, Railroad attorneys and the representatives of capital it as radical and the revolutionary have used the initiative to present to the people the propose repeal of certain sections of the
constitution which they claim constitution which they claim
restrict railroad building in the state.
While provision was made by the constitution itself for
the adoption of the initiative the adoption of the initiative
and referendum, it was not put into practical operation until after laws to put it into effect had been adopted by the First state legislature. The per voters required for the different classes of petitions was fix ed by the constitutional convention, but none of the de-
tails of the scheme worked out. It requires 8 per cent of the legal voters, as shown by the
vote cast at the last general vote cast at the last general
election, to intiate a law. 15 per cent to initiate a constitutional amendment, and 5 per cent to secure the referring to the people of an act already passed by the legislature.
In order to secure to the peo ple the right of a referendum their approval, the constitution their approval, the constitution
also provided that no laws also provided that no laws ninty days after the adjourn ment of the legislature, except such as were necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety and a two-thirds vote in each house was required in order to declare such an emergency, which has undoubtedly been abused and many laws put in-
to immediate effect through its agency which had no emergency character, yet it is hard to see where any other plan could be devised which would ment of real emergency meas ment and yet suspend the operaure and yet suspend the opera-
tion of others in order to allow a referendum vote if de sired
A law or part of a law may be referred by the legislature itself under the referendum, as well as on petition of the peoture under this provision made

There were two proposed constitutional amendments, one for the adoption of the Terrens land system and he other to remove the re strictions on the permanent location of the state capital before 1913; a proposition intend ed to get an expression of
sentiment from the people on the idea of selecting an idea site for the capital when located and building a new city there, and a proposition for the
retention or rejection of the state dispensary plan of handling the liquor question.
All were voted on at the general election in 1908. The (wo constitutional amendment received a majority of the votes
cast on these particular subects, but not a majority of all the votes cast at the election and were, therefore, declared The ideal capital or "New Jeruselem" proposition was declared carried, and the ispensary proposition was vot d down by an overwhelming vote, but the election on that roposition was later declared void by the supreme court, on account of technical irregu arities in the title of the pro position as submitted to the
people. This is the only case o far where the people hav been unable to carry out their will through the initiative and referendum, and the only case where the syst
The first initiated bill was also voted upon at the same election. It was one for the sale of all the school lands o the state, and was defeated by big majority.

## Editor Artesia Advocate:

 I thank you for the falthful reproduction of my recent letter on mattion, or rather the proposed constitution for the new state of New Mex ico. Many of your readers have expressed themselves as pleased both with the ideas themselves, and the fair mented on them. As to the latterI have only this remark to make. In regard to the representation in the convention, you say that under the Beveridge bill the representation is based upon the delegate vote and not upon the census, which is correct, and of which I was perfectly well aware. I havebelleved upon the authority of the believed upon the authority of the
Washington Star and others that the Washington Star and others that the
democratic senators would insist that this be changed to a census footing, and a slight consideration of the statehood forces in the upper house will disclose that if they are minded to do so they can very nearly if not wholly compel this amendment. That gifted and certainly well posted correspondent, Frank F. Forbes, in his syndicate letters, says that this will be the only point fought by the democratic
senators and that they can compel its concession. I was and am perfectly well aware that if the matter were left to the republican organization it will remain as it is in the Beveridge bill, but all legislation is a matter of compromise, and the democrats can easily carry the point if they have the wit and the determination to do so. It must not be contrued that
am blaming the republican managers for basing the representation upon the delegate vote. It is perfectly fair political strategy, and would certainly be resorted to by the democrats if they were in the republican place and could get away with it. The feeling has democratic senators were going to so granted in all of my writings so grabect, and I will be very ma surprised if the democrats in the senate fail to take advantage of their
opportunity and so force an equal break in the convention. This would be preferable in every way to a nonpartisan convention, for you well know I have not much faith in hemaphrodism in politics. There is nothing like
fixing the responsiblity in politics, ixing the responsibility in politics,
and the constitutional convention should be controlled by the party which has the most votes, as proved by a tidy fight at the polls.
THE INITIATIVE AND SO FORTH. The principle of the initiative and referendum is being brought forth by a great many, and I notice some reference to it in your editorials, as a proprespondent from Artesia insists that the recall should be hitched on that phase of the charter. I cannot agree with him, or with any part of the trinfty except the referendum. It is perfectly plain to me that both the
first and the last are absolutely impracticable and unscientifc. Under the Berne plan, anybody can introduce a law to the legislature and the rel rather the endorsement of 500 legal voters. If such a plan were in vogue in New Mexico there would be multi-
tude of laws introduced, entalling vast expenditure of money in their submission, based upon apheavals of the mob spirit that with the swift revulhight toll the low whe has at tres mitted, As it is we have too many laws already, what we need is a better enforcement of what we have, and introduce laws suggested by their fancy would be to start something sense. Watterson expresses this very
