## Alfalfa Mill Burned.

The burning of the alfalfa feed mill owned by J. O. Kuyrkendall Tuesday was a loss not only to the owner but to the community. The origin of the fire is unknown. The mill was erected at a cost of about $\$ 20$, 000 worth of baled alfalfa at 000 worth of baled alfalfa at
the time the fire broke out. It was beyond control from the beginning. The insurance amounted to $\$ 7,300$. Mr. Kuvrkendall had refused to consider a, proposition to sel the mill for $\$ 15,000$ a few days before the fire.
The heroic and difficult work of the fire department saved the power house of the electric light company and other property.

There is plenty of pressure in the artesian wells to furnish water to the town but note nough to give sufficient pres sure to put out a big fire, therefore the sensible thing to do is to get a fire engine and draw water from all three wells. At present the pump at the power house can scarcely help at all unless all the wells but one are shut off, whereas if we had an engine water would be drawn from all three by simply attaching to any hydrant. This advice he has frequently given heretore and lilloks to be the only sad the porkion advanced. If the tank and the tower were both kept full and the engine purchased we would have the best system in the valley. In the meantime, the
town ought to encourage the company in every possible way and a good beginning would be to adopt the recommenda tions of its chief.

should prove fairly successful, and it can scarcely hope to be more, it will find its victorie minimized and its failures magnitied and distorted by a rostile press. Nor, will the support of the Socialistic press be much less murderous than ne old parties. Among a of ain class of folks the "Appeal to Reason," is looked upon as a bible, but this is not the class which possesses either the highest culture or the most intelligence, and the unqualified telligence, and the unqualified
endorsement of everything Socialistic by that and other imilar papers coupled with ndiscriminate abuse of all hings not Socialistic will preudice many of our best peole against even the meritori ous acts of the Milwaukee ad ministration.
Lastly, aside from the man ner in which Socialism is ci cumscribed as described above here are two grave danger which threaten the adminis tration in Milwaukee, and both of them spring from the probable character of the men elected. In every reform movement and to a still great ary movent in every revolution-
ary two classes forge to the front: The venal who have been driven out of the old parties or forced out by circumstances; and who see ing no chance of future pre ferment in their old homes at tach themselves to something new in the hope that some thing will turn up; and when it does they are among th irst to take advantage of the situation and not rarely suc ceed in foisting thenaselves ino place by means of superio experience in manipulation.
This class is composed al most exclusively of grafters and if it has no representative
in the new regime in Milwaukee, it is proof that the age of miracles is still with us. But his class is if anything less annoying and fatal to intelligent innovators than the honest zealots who have certain inflexible rules which they ap pithout taking of situations vithout taking conditions into more administrations wreen more reforms retarded,

Considering everything, socialism has little to hope from the Milwaukee situation, and it ought to repudiate the idea that its principles must rise or fall with the success or failure of that particular or anv other particular local experiment.

old parties have not proven ald parties have not proven
howling successes; yet their howling successes; yet their
leaders are not willing to conceders are not willing to con-
cede that their parties have atterly failed.

Does the corruption under the Tammany regime in New York give us a line on the merits of the Democratic contention on the tariff and other national is-
sues; does the still greater sues; does the still greater
venality in Pittsburg and Philadelphia prove conclusively that the attitude of the national Republican administra tion in regard to the Philipines is mistaken or criminal?
While writing the above in the interest of fair play, we wish to be understood, as be emphatically and irrevocably opposed to Socialism. We believe that if entrusted with power in every state and in the bation at large and if the ma chinery were turned over to
the Socialists tomorrow that they would fall down utterly and absolutely, and that they would not even have a plan
upon which to work. We believe that this would be the case regardless of whether the officers were members of the Socialist Labor party or the Socialist party strictly socalled. Moreover, we do not believe that the mind of man will eve Socialism under the conscious sociarvis of the conscious ment; though a voluntary system of integral co-operation might be among future possi bilities.
Still we do not believe that hought should be clouded by the sort of misrepresentation,
conscious or otherwise, which assumes that the Milwaukee experiment is a final test of the name of Socialism.
And while on the subject it might be well to remark that while the Socialist Labor party is largely composed of foreigners, the regular Socialist party which won in Milwaukee and ority includes the vast ma country contains at least as arge a proportion of American orn members as any other political party in the United States.

Sec. 7 That the owners of lots abutting said proposed sidewalks, as herein above set out are hereby given 90 days from and after this ordinance takes effect in which to complete the laying of the sidewalk specified in Section 1, 2 and 3 hereof.
Sec. 8 That in the event of the failure of the owner or owners of said abutting lots within the territory described in this ordinance, to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, the same will be done by authority of the said Town of Artesia, and the costs thereof will be assessed and collected, together with the cost of any action that may be brought against any one o cases by law made and provid ed.
Sec. 9 This ordinance shall
ave been published one week
in the Artesia Advocate prior paper of general circulation in said town of Artesia, Ne Mexico, (there being no news paper of daily circulation pub lished in said town) and shal be published twice in said newspaper after its passage effect from and after said last publication.
