#### Alfalfa Mill Burned.

The burning of the alfalfa feed mill owned by J. O. Kuyr kendall Tuesday was a loss not only to the owner but to the community. The origin of the fire is unknown. The mill was erected at a cost of about \$20, 000 and contained nearly \$3, 000 worth of baled alfalfa at the time the fire broke out. I was beyond control from the beginning. The insurance amounted to \$7,300. Mr. Kuvr kendall had refused to consider a proposition to sell the mill for \$15,000 a few days before the fire.

The heroic and difficult work of the fire department saved the power house of the electric light company and other property.

Right here is a good time to say a few words in regard to the department. It has work ed faithfully for several years without money or price under the able management of its efficient chief, C. R. Echols and ought to be encouraged. It is true that heretofore the city has been unable to do anything but it is now in a better position. No company on earth could have done more or saved more than was done and saved Tuesday but under other circumstances conditions might be different. The present conditions with reference to water are set forth by Chief Echols substantially as follows;

There is plenty of pressure in the artesian wells to furnish water to the town but note nough to give sufficient pressure to put out a big fire, therefore the sensible thing to do is to get a fire engine and draw water from all three wells. At present the pump at the power house can scarcely help at all unless all the wells but one are shut off, whereas if we had an engine water would be drawn from all three by simply attaching to any hydraut. This advice he has frequently given heretofore and it looks to be the only sane proposition advanced. If the tank and the tower were both kept full and the engine purchased we would have the best system in the valley. In the meantime, the maker at Harpold & Co.

They realize that the Republican party, as the dominant party, must be responsible for the future of the territory, as it has been responible, in the past, and that to take this course would preclude any possiblity of delay by non-approval of the constitution at Washington. The problems of the future must be settled by legislation. No sane person desires legislation that is not constitutional. That being the case it is the part of common sense to shut off the fanatic anarchists that will creep into every constructive convention, reaffirm the document that has been one of the governmental wonders of the world, and leave the destiny of the territory to the safe hands of the Republican party and its representatives. Such a course would certainly be absolutely safe. - Register-Tribune.

The idea is certainly unique in its absurdity: for much as we generally admire the Register-Tribune, and little as we like to use a term of contempt in regard to an able and honorable contemporary, no other expression would fill the bill.

Why does the R. T. want the constitution of the United States reaffirmed? Insofar as it relates to state affairs, that is done by implication in every state constitution adopted, and beyond state affairs the state constitution has no force or effect whatever. Does the Register-Tribune want the State of New Mexico to provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States, does it want said new state to coin money and regulate the value thereof, make treaties with foreign nations and with Indian tribes, and levy taxes, duties, imposts and excises, establish post offices and postroads, create an army and navy, a national senate and house of representatives with a complete judicial system composed of a supreme court and such other inferior courts as congress may from time to time see fit to create? If not what does it want? This government of our is constitutional in form, and every state statute must conform to a preexisting state constitution. No constitution; no state law. Therefore, whatever might be said of fanatics, there is no doubt that if a state were created without a state constitution, it would be a Mecca for the anarchists of the world, since it would have no legislature or legislation, no governor, or other executive or peace officer and no courts.

Fortunately however, such a policy is rendered impossible by the document which the Register-Tribune proposes to endorse for the constitution of the Unijed States provides that before a state is admitted it shall at least have a Republican form of government.

#### Impressions of a Tenderfoot.

A LETTER FROM CHRIST.

Beginning back at the year one I began to receive copies of "chain letters" each one of whom required the insertion of some expression of value and forwarding to some other sucker in the cause of charity. The industry languishes at times, but it comes back again at more or less regular intervals, and the other day I received a copy of the pass-along letter purported to have been written by Christ. It is something of a curiosity. According to the story that is hitched to it, 'a little child something like a thousand years ago turned over a stone and found the letter. Since that time whoever keeps a copy of the letter in his house has good luck, and whoever gets a copy and doesn't copy it again and pass it along will have the reverse. The letter is distinctly unique, and I quote it herewith to make my part of the passalong good on a wholesale scale:

"Whosoever works on the Sabbath day shall be cursed. commanded you to go to church and keep holy the Lord's day without any manner of work. You shall not be idle or misspend your time in bedecking yourself in superfluities of costly apparel and vain dressing, for I will have ordered it a day of rest. Your land shall be replenished and bring forth abundance and I will comfort you in the greattemptation, and surely he that doeth to the contrary shall be cursed.

"I will also send hardness to the heart of them, and especially on hardened and unpenitent believers. He that hath given to the poor shall find it profitable. Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day, for the seventh day I have taken as a resting day to myself.

Of course I am not expected to attach my endorsement to the authenticity of the letter. It really doesn't matter. All moral uplift comes sort of inspiration or other and if the alleged letter has effect that way once in a million it is worth while. Anyhow I have passed it along and there is no more bad luck coming to me from having kept it quiet. you feel that this admonition appeals to you pass this paper along yourself. People have been doing so at times for fifty vears, dating from the time it was brought to this country, according to the self-elected historian of the letter, Mrs. Fannie Wortman, of Marion, Ind., who is undoubtedly devoted to her task but short on the attending facts.

One hundred and sixty-seven vears ago today April 12 was born the most profound statesman this nation produced-Thomas Jefferson. This statement does not detract in the least from the renown justly earned by the hundreds of great men who have given prominent service to the country in both peace and in war. It simply places Jefferson in a class by himself where his fame and the luster of his labors are not contrasted with the achievements of other men. Jefferson was not a warrior nor was he an orator. But his pen was mightier than the sword and he swayed the nation with its invincible logic. He was a builder, a constructive statesman whose vision could pierce the future and whose wisdom would provide for conditions that had not yet arisen. And above all else he was a patriot, with unyielding devotion to the cause of liberty and a heart overflowing with love for his fellow-man. Dureleven years \$51,000,000 special cash and stock dividends were paid in addition to the annuel ones. In 1898 the company stock was increased from \$36,000,000 to \$100,000,000 of which \$20,000,000 is accounted for by the acquisition of the Wagner Palace Car company. The rest of the increase of \$44, 000,000 represents capitalization of surplus. The record shows that no additional capital was put in.


