Since the consolidaion of the banks the Peoples National has been one of the trong financial institutions of the state and has prospered accordingly, ond has assetts of nore than $\$ 500.000 .00$.
Mr. Hall expects to leave here about August 1 and go to Artesia, N. M. where his sons Phil and Max are in business and doing well and where it is probable that he will also get into the investment and loan busihess later. The only reason for the sale was that Mrs. Hall's health will not permit her to main here and she has done o well in Artesia where she well in Artesia where she
