

Sir:

In response to your inquiry of some days ago, requesting my views on some of the most important measures which the democrats should advocate as provisions to be inserted in our state constitution, I take pleasure in submitting the following which now occur to me:

1. A provision to establish a state corporation commission to be elected by the people, clothed with ample authority to regulate and control public serving corporations and fix reasonable rates, subject to the right of appeal to the supreme court.

2. 



The country over there are few old timers, more especially at the mechanical end of the trade, where the pace that kills and the typesetting machine that kills more; are busy all the time laying them out. 
