## Yesterday Looking Over Situation.

 Will Surely Build.The Katy has purchased the Texas Central and will extend its lines from Rotan, Texas, to El Paso, according to the of ficials who came here yesterday from Lovington and went north from Artesia. Surveys have been made through Fluvana and other towns in the Lone Star State, Artesia being on the line of the original survey.
Those comprising the party now sizing up conditions are C, H. Sharman, chief engineer of the Texas Central; P. C. d Morris, his first assistant; H. J. Cureton, attorney for the company, and T. Trammel who blazed the way for the Orient and who, being formerly in the cattle business in New Mexico, knows the country well.
Mr. Sharman stated positively that the extension would be made, but we are not prepared to say which route would be followed.

power of a state directly in the hands of the people. The immediate object of the initiative is to enable the peo-
ple to initiate legislation without de ple to initiate legislation without de
pending upon the members of a state legislature to propose needed laws By the referendum the people are en abled to call back to themselves and
either approve or disapprove a measither approve or disapprove a meas ure that has been passed by the stat
legislature. The purpose of both i legislature. people a firmer grip on
o give the peor the reins of government than they now have under the present system of dolegated government.
The Optic is heartily in favor of anything that will minimize politica and legislative influence of corpora tions and other combinations of cap1tal in the affairs of the state of New
Mexico. We are, however, visiter with grave and sincere doubts as to initiative and the referendum. Under the system now in use in out two or three of the states of this union there is no initiative and no
