So that after having made sure of a safe majority by clinching their hold in all Republican divisions, they would cut down the Democratic minority to such a small fraction that it would have no voice whatever in the making of the constitution. In other words the opinions of practically one half of the people of New Mexico, possessing its full share of the intelligence, progress and patriotism of the commonwealth, would be ruled out without a hearing.

Three Days Celebration of Opening Of Irrigation Project

Portales is going to celebrate the opening of her ten thousand acre irrigation project in a three days' Water Carnival, to be held on August 18, 19, 20. A special invitation is extended to visitors to be there on those dates to see their irrigation wells being pumped, throwing throwing twelve to fourteen hundred gallons per minute, and see their big power plant running. This power plant has two seven hundred and fifty horsepower producer gas engines, direct connected electric generators, three gas producers and electricity is carried over seventy two miles of transmission lines. An important feature of the celebration will be the auction sale of one thousand ten acres of land under this project, in tracts of ten acres and up, on liberal terms. As an extra inducement to buyers, a town lot will be given to the first twenty-five purchasers of irrigated tracts, and also provision for refunding railroad fare to purchasers. This auction sale takes place on Saturday August the 20th at 9:30 A. M. Free Automobile transportation will be furnished visitors from a distance to see the wells.

ALFALFA PASTURE.

Brice on Constitution.

August 3, 1910,

Editor Advocate, Artesia, N. Mex. Dear Sir: -

Replying to your request of my views on what should be incorporated in the constitution of the new State of New Mexico, I will endeavor to comply.

I usually have decided views on every public question and do not hesitate to express them. It is useless to mention the provisions for the three branches of the government. With reference to the courts 1 am not prepared at this time to express my views, as they are not entirely formulated. However, I am in favor of an elective judiciary and am in favor of such election being held at sometime other than at the regular election, so that it may be as much removed from politics as is possible.

Next to the provisions for the three branches of government I favor the following provisions and place them in the order of their importance as I see it: -

2. A limitation upon the power of the state, counties, cities, towns and school districts to tax the people.

as important as the other, nor is the taxing power so liable to be abused and the power to abuse should be taken away.

3. The incorporation of the initiative and referendum.

If we have the initiative and referendum we shall be able to get just such laws as the people want. They may be good laws or they may be bad, but whatever we do have will be the voice of the people, and if we get bad laws it will be because we are not entitled to good ones. I am not sure that the initiative and referendum will work well in all cases; but certainly the will of the people. if the people are left to act according to their own dictates, would control.

4. For the establishment of a railway or corporation commission along the lines of that State of Texas.

I am in favor of this because I doubt seriously if we would ever get a railway commission unless it is incorporated in the constitution. Ordinarily I would be in favor of leaving it to the legislature, but having been a member of the last legislature and having assisted in passing a railway commission bill through the House only to see it killed in the Council, I know how exceedingly hard it would be to have such a law
