Artesia which since its foundation has been universal $y$ and rightly regarded as the nost moral and sober munici pality in New Mexico, has de cided that, though the law is better enforced here than elsewhere within the "Land of Sunshine," yet as there are occasional infractions, notwithstanding the vigilence of the officers, it is well for the people to co-operate actively with the city administration in preventing any violation whatsoever. Hence there was a great outpouring at the Presbyterian church Monday nigh when the Artesia Law and Order League organized and lected officers.
While we were not informed of the contemplated meeting or the purpose thereof until we had made other arrangements which prevented our attending, we learn that the following is substantially what trak Blace: the meeting was called to order after which Gayle Talbot was elected presi dent; W. F. Schwartz vice president; C. E. Mann secretary and S. W. Gilbert treasu rer. These officers with J. D
H. Reed constitute the execu H. Reed constitute the execu tive committee of the order.
A committee on constitution
and bylaws consisting of E. B. Kemp, J. H. Jackson and Rev. A. E. Boyd was then appointed. On request that the society be named at once be fore the adoption of forma laws this committee reported in favor of naming the order "The Artesia Law and Order League." Rev. J. Allen Ray League. Rev. W. L. Bishop offered a further amendment that the marshal receive $\$ 7.50$ and the city attorney 8.50 ; which motion was carried by a vote of 59 to 9. W. L. "Be it Resolved: That the calling of and the proceedings caling of and the proceedings of the Artesia Law and Order League are not intended as
any reflection upon any officer any reflection upon any officer
of the town of Ariesia, past or of the town of Ariesia, past orpose of aiding in the future every official and citizen in every effort to enforce the ordinances of the Town of Artesia.
The meeting adjourned to meet at the Presbyterian church on the night of August 30 .

This naturally leads to the dea of signed editorial which is now gaining ground. Any reputable editor can convince more people by a signed article than he can by an article in which the paper instead of the individual is made responible. Where the editor is known there is no real reason why this should be the case; but it is. Probably this is because readers are used to seeing so much editorial matter by the man that they disregard it to a great extent, but when
the same editor in the same paper comes out with a signed production it attracts attention effect.
The Hearst newspapers are not supposed to be especially reputable.
What they say editorially is generally disregarded by think ing people, but when Hearst writes a signed article for his own papers it is instantly quoted in all other publication and has a widespread effect. The Denver newspapers are notoriously "yellow," but when Hugh O'Neal of the Post or Ed Keating of the News writes an article over his own signature it is read with avidity by folks who would overlook the same article by the same man, if it appeared unsigned. The day is not yet here for the signed editorial to be generally adopted by small newspapers; but it is coming.
When it does, the anonymous writer will forever disappear. That gentlemen of Mr. Brice' caliber should become indignant at unsigned libels is a healthy sign. A decade ago this method of attack would be considered legitimate enough though the content were false and misleading, they were in this case.

 ment Showing Growth of the Pe cos Valley City in Past Twenty Months.A committee appointed by the Commercial Club of Aresia, after conservative and painstaking labor, have submitted the following flattering tatement of conditions in the Artesia Country, together with data relative to growth of the town and increase of business since January 1, 1909. The acts set forth are based upon actual figures and not exaggerated in the least.
Within a radius of seven miles of Artesia there are 11, 780 acres of irrigated land lanted in alfalfa, 4780 orchards and (about) 2500 acres in other field crops,
