M.-The Re publican leaders still insist that they can ferce the nomination upon nationa commileema Sol in Lina who is just as inrm in declarin that under no circumstance would be accept the nomina tion. Especially active in urg ing Mr. Lupa to make the rac are Charles A. Spiess, of La Vegas, and Thomas B. Catron of Santa Fe . They recognize that everything pivots on the governorship and that imme diately that it is decided th enatorial situation simplife itself and the selection of the reat of the state ticket will be rest on the come manh easier. So further the Luna candidacy, Mr. Spies has had Secundo Romero, sheriff of San Miguel county endorsed by his home commit tee for governorship. Chaves county has also a favorite son for the place, territorial secre tary Nathan Jaffa, but, strange to say, the politicians are con ceding that Mr. Jaffa is a good possibility for congress and even for the United States sen ate, but will not consider him for the winernothip him or the governorship, although have their hearta seen it

For congress, George Curry and Charles A. Spiess are most prominently mentioned But Mr. Spiess, like Mr. Luna is emphatic in declaring that he will not accept any nomination for any place. Nathan Jaffa can have one of the nomnations it is declared, and 0 . A. Larrazola, the most recent accession from the Democratic party, may have the nominaton also, it is declared.
While the senatorship is not in direct issue at present, yet it cannot be denied that the andidates for the toga and heir friends are most active in seeking to name the state tick t. With Mr. Luna out of the way, the best guess for the senatorships at present is Charles Springer, of Cimarron, and W. H. Andrews of Albuquerque. The other four possibilities at at this time are Nathan Jaffa gain, A. B. Fall, William J Mills, and Thomas B. Catron. The nomination for the state ecretaryship at present lies between George W.
