In Curry county the majori ty for McClure was about 200.
Roosevelt county gave Reese its home candidate, a majority of less than 400 , but that is a small voting strength.
Eddy county gave Reese and Dow majorities ranging be tween 200 and 300, and Artesia precinct gave over 200 of thi majority, though nothing like a complete vote was polle here.
Hinkle, won for senator in Chaves county as did all the anti-prohibitionist candidates, it is claimed.

Democratic Harmony and Success.

In Eddy county each commu nity has its candidates for the various positions, and a nomivarious positions, and a nomi-
nation in the democratic primary to be held Oct. 14th is considered equivalent to an election.
At the outset of this count campaign, it was repeatedly told the Advocate that Carls bad was forcing the county di vision issue to the front in its attempt to make deals with different sections of the county with the view of county seat preferment. If this effort at a combination was made, its ear ly exposure by the Advocate disrupted the scheme that was said to have been formulated said to have been formulate by Carlsbad, and apparently
there is not now any county di
vision issue.
As the different portions of Eddy county have disclaimed
any disposition or intention to form a coalition with Carlsbad on county division or county seats, it is not necessary for the Advocate to further consider these questions of paramount importance. The candidates also disclaim that there is any combination of county division This brings us then to the consideration of what is best for democratic harmony and subsequent success, and we believe this to be for the Advocate to cease any further ex-
pressed preference for any can didate for any position. In doing this, however, the Advocate has nothing to retract in way of commendation or criticis

Montreal, Que., Sept. 21. The liberal government of Sir Wilfred Laurier suffered a dis astrous defeat in the Canadian elections held today
The result came in the face of the confident hope that $i$ would be sustained on the par amount issues it had made of reciprocity between. Canada and the United States
Seven members of the Lauri er ministry were among the de feated members reported in the earlier returns of the evening with other liberal minister still in doubt, and the current strong against them.
Sir. Wilfred Laurier is elect ed in Quebec east, as the seat had not been contested.
Kalamazoo, Mich., Sept. 21President Taft heard the re turns from the Canadian elec tions here today, while attend ing a banquet given him by the citizens of this city.
'I am greatly disappointed.' e said.
Further than this Mr. Taft declined to discuss the subject tonight.
After he had analyzed the complete returns, he undoubtedly will issue a statement or incorporate his views in a peech.
President Taft at the banquet onight said:
