Capt. E. P. Bujac, the able lawyer and eloquent orator of Carlsbad, spoke last Saturday at Artesia in behalf of his canof ' District No county which is his home.
Capt, Bujac first had a chance to make a few remarks to a number of the members of the commercial club and other citizens who had met in called session. He took occasion to assure those present that the iron bridge east of Artesia wa tract had been let and when finished this time it was be lieved it would withstand the floods down the Pecos.
At the night meeting a large crowd gathered and Judge G U. McCrary introduced the dis tinguished speaker. Capt. Bujac prefaced his remarks pertaining to his candidacy by telling the Artesia citizen how much they had accom plished in such short space of time and how well they had builded, and that their work was only begun, as their pros pects for the f
bright indeed.
Touching again the bridge east of Artesia, he called at tention to the fact that it was he who circulated the petition to secure this bridge and ha worked faithfully and continu ously for it until its comple tion. He also said that thi bridge and the one at Carlsba would finally cost Eddy county nothing as the indebtedness of by the munificent gift of public land made by the governmen in granting us statehood.

Buac. aloo called at had proffered his assistance to Artesia people to give them re lief sought in tax reductions and in cther ways had shown his friendliness for the town and her people. Persons present verifled his statements as to these instances of his will ingness to grant the requests made.
He also took occasion to de fend himself against the as persions in the Carlsbad Cur rent. ## BIG DAM BREAKS

Hundreds of Lives Lost and Grea Damage, Done.

Coudersport, Pa., Sept. 30... One thousand men, women and children, more than fourth of the total population were drowned, and countless numbers were injured this afernoon when the mammoth dam of the Bayless Pulp and Paper Company burst and with roar surpassing that upon of the Niagra poured more than a half a billion gallons of water down upon the town of Austin fourteen miles from this city.
Located in the valley between two high hills that extends east and west for miles, Austin was at the mercy of the flood which swept nearly every building away, piling them up at the mouth of a narrow gully east of town. Then fire quick $y$ added its terror. The flames raging unchecked, roasting alive the victims who remain in the debris. 139 bodies had ute only a fraction of the en tire number of victims, many fhom have been swept on down the valley with the flood

are understood to have agreed to permit Italy a "Pacific penetration of Tripoli." ## What They Forget.

 In their desperate effort to ram a rotten ticket down the throats of the republicans of New Mexico, there are several things that the state machine by the noble and affection inspiring Mr. Bursum forgets. It forgets that the announcement of its present brazen pro gratm has already had the effect of driving hundreds of disgusted republicans into the democratic party.It forgets that there is a lim it beyond which the loyalty of true republicans w!ll not go. It forgets that the progres of education and enlightnmen and development in New Mex ico has enabled a good many citizens to see through the party label to the man under neath; and that there are many people who are in favor of a political pure food law, mak ing misbranding a crime.
It forgets that a cenus has recently been taken. This cen sus gives the official govern ment figures on the population of such counties as San Mig uel, Valencia and Sandoval This census, we understand enables one to find out pretty accurately how many voter there are, for instance, in a pre cinct like that of Cuba, San doval county, where the vot lation of men, women and children and burros and goats. This census will make it a lit tle difficult for the Valencia county manager to telegraph to the head of the machine "How many votes do you
need?"
It is a generally accepted estimate that the popu lation runs about one voter to four or five people; at the minimum not less than one to four These census figures in fact will prove more invaluable when it comes to investigating how many freeborn and soverign sheep cast their wooly votes in Valencia on the tariff question.
The machine forgets that the old regime of terrorism is passing rapidly with the increase in the number of un-muzzled newspapers, the increase in railroads and automobile lines and other means of communication and the resulting vast increase in publicity that has come in the past five years.
The machine forgets in short that the people of New Mexico

are not having as much of their former years.
The machine fails to consider the fact that there is a limit to the political digestion of the voter and that there are certain things which even the most hardened stomach must disgorge.
Mr. Bursum has a pretty fair team roller; but the work of his machine is after all, rather crude as far as any ayerage po litical sagacity or shrewdness s concerned.
