## Lands a Force Under Protectin

 Fire of its Fleet..-No Great Damage Done City.Rome, Uct. 4.-After fight ng a losing struggle against the heavy guns of the Italian warships, the Turkish troops at Tripoli today abandoned the demolished fortifications, ran up the white flag and retreated outside" the city, while Italy's large landing party was by a large landing party was flung
from the badly depleted Gover from the bady depleted Govercupied the Turkish city.
The bombardment extended over more than a day, with fre quent cessations to give the Turks an opportunity to sur render and prevent
necessary loss of life.
There were many fatalitie among Turks who heroically defended their ancient fortress but the Italian fleet escaped without serious damage.
Information of the victory came to Rome by wireless and when the news was officially announced by special edition of the evening papers, the
crowds in the streets went wild with enthusiasm.
The report of the bombardment of Tripoli shows that the Italian gunners displayed ex cellent,marksmenship. Except for the Turkish troops and a few sympathizers

50 and possibly more, 150 and possibly more, while he property loss will go into the millions.
The great Johnstown flood, the most disastrous in the history of the United States, still retains its place in history al though the Austin, Pa. flood of Saturday, is probably the second most disastrous. In the Johnstown flood, which occur Jed May 31, 1889, which occurred May 31, 188, a tetal of 2235 people lost their lives, 800 of
whom were never identified and are now buried in a small cemetery near town. The Johnstown flood was caused by the breaking of a dam which impounded the waters of Conemaugh lake, which was $21-2$ tniles long, $11-2$ miles wide and in places a hundred feet deep. This flood, besides its terrible toll in life, resulted in the destruction of about $\$ 10$, 000,000 worth of property
In the Galveston tidal wave lood, Sept. 8, 1900, 6000 lives were lost and $\$ 18,000,000$ in property destroyed.

He counseled mod ration and extended a cordial invitation to the progressive republicans who have denounc ed the nominations by the re publican convention.
G. A. Richardson, of Ros well, was elected permanent chairman and responded in a creditable spcech.
Resolutions embodying the declaration of principles upon which the democratic party will appeal to the voters of New Mexico, were adopted, and will be published later.
W. C. McDonald was nomi nated for governor without op position, and at this event as other times when he appeared before the convention, the applause was enthusiastic and long continued. He has proven himself capable as chairman of the state central committee and will be as effective as the lead er in the coming election.
