## ARTESIA TAKES LEAD

## At Roswell Products Exposition by Capturing 21 First Prizes and Five Second, Winning Cup.

Artesia certainly did hersel proud at the Roswell Products Exposition, and which by-theway should have really been named the ARTESIA Products Exposition.
First prize was taken on community display; on alfalfa; sweepstakes on five boxes of apples; first on two boxes Mo. Pippin: on one box same apple; on one box White Winter ple; on one box White Winter
Pearman; first on box WinePearman; first on box Wine-
sap: first on quinces; first on plate White Winter Pearman; first on peaches; first on Arkansas Black apples; and second on peaches; cantaloupes and grapes, The total first prizes numbered 21 and 5 second prizes.
The Roswell Morning News had the following description of the Artesia display:
"The Artesia booth was beautifully arranged. The central pyramid of apples and beautiful ears of corn was surmounted by a huge cornicopia of geen, showing fruits and vegetables. A backgrcund of corn softened the wall, flowers and corn lent grace, while vegetables gave a solid foundation. There were the choicest fruits of all kinds.

Artesia carried off twenty-one first prizes and five second and a blue ribbon for seedless pears. Artesia also received the $\$ 25$ prize for the most unique alfalfa display, a huge fireplace with a cozy looking red fire that in the cool eve ig looked tempting enough for one to wish for a chair and book beside it. They had also a huge tomato plant that had upon it eighty-five tomatoes. It was a volunteer."
"Roswell divided the highest honors with Artesia, taking tim cash part of the first prize $-\$ 50$.
Artesia was indeed so close to Roswell or Roswell so close to Artesia that one could scarcely see a difference, so Artesia took the silver cup presented by Messrs. M. O. Coggins \& Co., of Pittsburg, Pa., and Lyon Bros. \& Co., of New York City.

Building A Low Water Bridge. The Pecos Riyer Irrigation \& Land Co., better known a the Smith \& Hanger Co., has begun active work on a low water bridge across the Pecos River to the north of here. This bridge, being rushed to completion, will save three or four miles between here and that ranch and other places adacent. The bridge is a private undertaking by this company, but will kindly be open to pub lic use. Smith and Hanger Co., has 3,000 acres of irrigated land, 1,000 acres of which is in alfalfa. ## BIG RECEPTION FOR McDONAID

Thousands Cheer Him at Roswell and he Makes a Good Speech.

Roswell, N. M., Oct. 7.-One ot the most remarkable demonstrations for a man in public ife in the history of the Pecos Valley occurred here this eve ning when Capt. W. C. Mc Donald of Carrizzo, democratic candidate for governor of New Mexico, stepped from the train. Three thousand people, including the many visitors gathered to attend the Roswell Produce exposition joined in a chorus of deafening acclamation for he nominee, the applause beng redoubled after a short speech in which the candidate thanked the citizens for their ordial reception.
The band then struck up ively air and Mr. McDonald proceeded to his hotel. His reception was a rèmarkable spontaneous outburst of enthu siasm and was significant of the strength the candidate will poll in the Pecos Valley counties. Mr. McDonald made anther speech tonight as the concluding feature of the big exposition which has proven more successful than expected and attended by thousands of people.
