ARTESIA TAKES LEAD

At Roswell Products Exposition by Capturing 21 First Prizes and Five Second, Winning Cup.

Artesia certainly did herself proud at the Roswell Products Exposition, and which by-theway should have really been named the ARTESIA Products on pickled apples. Exposition.

First prize was taken on tomatoes; first prize onions. community display; on alfalfa; sweepstakes on five boxes of best display canned goods apples; first on two boxes Mo. Pippin: on one box same apple; on one box White Winter Pearman; first on box Winesap: first on quinces; first on plate White Winter Pearman; first on peaches; first on Arkansas Black apples; and second on peaches; cantaloupes and grapes, The total first prizes numbered 21 and 5 second prizes.

The Roswell Morning News had the following description of the Artesia display:

"The Artesia booth was beautifully arranged. The central pyramid of apples and beautiful ears of corn was surmounted by a huge cornicopia of green, showing fruits and vegetables. A background of corn softened the wall, flowers and corn lent grace, while vegetables gave a solid foundation. There were the choicest fruits of all kinds.

Artesia carried off twenty-one first prizes and five second and a blue ribbon for seedless pears.

Artesia also received the \$25 prize for the most unique alfalfa display, a huge fireplace with a cozy looking red fire that in the cool evering looked tempting enough for one to wish for a chair and book beside it. They had also a huge tomato plant that had upon it eighty-five tomatoes. It was a volunteer."

"Roswell divided the highest honors with Artesia, taking cash part of the first prize

He has been showing the silver trophy won by the Artesia community exhibit at the exposition to the crowds at the depot and on the streets.

He estimates the value to Artesia as at least \$15,000 and says it cannot be bought for even twice that sum. Conn is the gentleman who exhibited the seven and a half pound bunch of grapes."

'Hope received an award of merit from its community exhibit. It was prettily arranged of boxes of apples, plates of fruit, many choice vegetables, with corn both red and white. Their lettering was nicely done in red plums. They received a first prize for Indian corn, a first prize for plums, a first prize for plate display of Jonathan apples, and a second tor peaches."

Much credit is due Rev. W. A. Dawson, W. F. Schwartz and J. M. Conn for the excellent arrangement of the Artesia display. They are surely experts in that line and are great boosters for their town. Rev. Dawson is known to be an able and eloquent preacher and he has shown himself to be also a designer of ability.

Messrs. R. M. Love, J. B. Cecil and Bert Chronkite also aided in making the exhibit a success.


