#### **NEW DEPOT CERTAIN**

#### Santa Fe Has Let the Contract for Veneered Brick Structure and Other Improvements.

The Santa Fe is finally preparing to give Artesia those public conveniences that its business and prominence as a shipping and passenger station deserve.

The new passenger depot has been agreed upon and will be 24x99 feet containing two waiting rooms and ticket office, baggage and express rooms. It will be veneered brick construction with red tile roof. The Turkey Track Ranch Getting. There will be no railroad tracks in front of it, but a 300 foot brick pavement will be put in. The cost of the building will be \$11,000.00.

The old passenger station will be remodled and moved across the tracks and raised to the height of freight cars and a high platform 250 feet long put in. This will make the handling of freight much easier and quicker.

The railroad tracks north will be extended beyond Eagle Draw, which is supposedly for the purpose of permitting connection with the San Diego, El Paso & St Louis R. R.

Reosonably sized stock pens will be put in north of the freight depot and by the extended side tracks. This is a convenience that Artesia has done without for a long while.

The contractor for this work is Mr. McLeod, of Chicago, who also has the building of the Hagerman depot, which is Work will be under way. started on these Santa Fe improvements as soon as the material arrives.

#### **BIG CATTLE RANCH OUITS**

### Rid of its Cattle and Will Sell Land and go Out of Business.

The old-time Turkey Track Ranch is soon to be numbered among other deserted ranches up into smaller tracts of land for the unsettled settler.

The Turkey Track Ranch which has been so well managed by Capt. Ed Tyson has recently shipped most of its cattle estimated at 7,000 head, and the owners, who are nonresidents, will sell the land and withdraw from this country. They have also recently sold a a big ranch in Montana.

It is reported that Capt. Ed Tyson will go into the cattle business in this section on his own account and may ship a bunch of cattle from Mexico.

The Turkey Track Ranch lies in both Eddy and Chaves counties. It is a land mark, and also has a history.



### THE HAND OF GOD

By REV. STEPHEN PAULSON

TEXT-The hand of God is upon all These words were spoken by Ezra the king Artaxerxes of Babylon. Ezra was sent back to Jerusalem with great stores of gold and silver for the temple. The king offered him a military guard for the journey, but Ezra declares it unnecessary, for, he says, "The hand of God is upon all them for good, that seek him.

Ezra here announces a fact which often passes out of our reckoning. There was a time when fatalism was the general creed and it still lingers in many minds. It is a dreary faith to live by and not true to facts. There is a more beautiful creed and more comforting, and that is the personal providence of a loving father—the hand of God upon all them for good that seek

First let us recognize that divine government in our lives is a fact. No one can live and defy God's laws with impunity. Many men seem to think that no notice is taken of their actions, and they go on in their evil ways and apparently prosper. Occasionally one may escape from the justice of human law, but there is no escape from divine law.

The hand of God is a disturbing element. You may be perfectly satisfied with yourself, but God is not satisfied with you. Only to one did he say, This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased." There are so many things in our lives that God is not pleased with if his hand is upon us for good. So God never allows us to remain in peace. You would not expect God's government in our lives to be one of indifference and tranquillity.

Do you think, for instance, that God is satisfied with social and moral and political conditions as they are? No, he is not. And therefore God is continually stirring up good men and influences to battle against evil and oppression and to spread the principles of his kingdom, and there are those who resent this divine interference and make his servants bear the brunt of their displeasure.

The gospel of Jesus Christ is a disturbing element wherever it comes, for it cannot exist side by side with evil and oppression, without striving to oppose and overcome them. That was what Jesus had reference to when he said, "I am not come to send peace upon the earth, but a sword.'

China lived in self-satisfied ignorance and darkness. Progress was an unknown word and not desired. The same customs and practices and the same primitive methods had obtained for 2,000 years. Then came the man with the gospel and it proved a disturbing element. Missionaries have sometimes been accused by shortsighted persons of causing disturbance and dissension. The charge is true in so far as they are true to the gospel they preach. It is the eternal and inevitable conflict between light and darkness, between truth and falsehood, between good and evil, between Christ and Satan.

The hand of God in human lives is a progressive element. God disturbs our lives to move them on to something better. With him there is never retrogression. If God asks me to strike my tent today to move yonder. it is because yonder there is a higher possibility, a more glorious outlook.

Progress is not necessarily pleasant. Notice how Moses speaks of the departure from Horeb, where many of Israelites were most willing to remain: "And when we departed from Horeb we went through all the great and terrible wilderness which ye saw by the way of the mountain of the Ammorites." It was progress, but it was not pleasant. It was through the great and terrible wilderness. It was difficult progress, but the goal was Canaan, the land of promise.

There is a beautiful illustration of the hand of God in human lives. in the thirty-second chapter of Deuteronomy: "As an eagle stirreth up her nest, fluttereth over her young, taketh them, beareth them on her pinions; so the Lord did lead him."

The picture is full of poetry, full of life and truth and beauty. Think over it. The nest is upon a rocky



#### KEEP FEEDING PAILS CLEAN

Farmers Do Not Pay Enough Attention to Sanitary Condition of Vessels Used for Feed.

One of our institute lecturers told us last winter that we ought to rinse out the pails after feeding the hogs, Friday evening at the Dawson every time. It cannot be if we feed the hogs from vessels that contain left over feed that has become sour and rancid from heat and exposure to the air. We sold 14 pigs that averaged 170 pounds to the local butcher last winter and when he came out to look them over he smarked that they were the cleanest lot of pigs he had bought for months. #### MAKE CONCRETE WATER TANK

One in Use at the Michigan Agricultural College Is Made of Ordinary Hollow Blocks.

To water the large herd of stock kept by the Michigan agricultural college a big concrete water tank was built. This is made out of ordinary

hollow concrete blocks of standard size, which were cast for a silo. They are well cemented on the inside to make the tank waterproof, says the Farm and Home.

A novel arrangement on the tank is a device for heating the water in winter. A 12-inch tile extends to the center of the tank, while a 4-inch pipe leading up from this furnishes the necessary flue. A grate is fitted in the tile to allow for a suitable draft, and in the door which closes it is an opening which can be opened or shut at will. The braces which hold the top in place also serve to support the hinged doors, which are closed down in cold weather.

of jealousy until the blood flowed.


