## BIG CATTLE RANCH QUITS

The Turkey Track Ranch Getting Rid of its Cattle and Will Sell Land and go Out of Business.

The old-time Turkey Track Ranch is soon to be numbered among other deserted ranches of the West, and finally be cut up into smaller tracts of lan for the unsettled settler.
The Turkey Track Ranch which has been so well managed by Capt. Ed Tyson has recently shipped most of it cattle estimated at 7,000 head and the owners, who are non residents, will sell the land and withdraw from this country. They have also recently sold a a big ranch in Montana.
It is reported that Capt. Ed Tyson will go into the cattle business in this section on his own account and may ship a bunch of cattle from Mexico.
The Turkey Track Ranch lies in both Eddy and Chaves counties. It is a land

The Turkey Track owns on New Mexico, ranch properties in New Mexico, and has an excel lent system of mills east of Ar tesia. They have been offered $\$ 20,000$ for the land and water rights which is considered a low valuation.
The Turkey Track brand was started by Dick McNulty, of Hanford county, Texas, who
sold to a company in 1882 , which was later organized as the Hanford Land and Cattle company. Later they bought out the Holt Live Stock company of Eddy county, and established the Turkey Track ranch on the plains east of the Pecos, with headquarters in Eddy county, near Chaves line. J. M. Coburn of Kansas City, a member of the Kansas City Live Stock and Commission company, was general mana ger for the new organization.
C. B. Willingham was the irst range manager in New Mexico, being later succeeded by Tobe Odom, and about four prcsent range manager suc ceeded Odom.

In the general change of catle owners and their ceasing the business, Dave Runyan and Dick Eaton, prominent and well-known local cattle men in this section, have sold Clarendon. Texas. Much of their range bunch has recently been shipped, estimated at 4,000 head.

## LYNCH IS CONVICTED

Eddy County Jury Returns Verdict of Murder in First Degree Against Slayer of Woofter.

Murder in the first degre was the verdict returned by an Eddy county petit jury agains James Lynch for killing City Marshal Roy Woofter at Ros well some months ago.
It is a death penalty for Lynch unless he can get a new rial. His plea was self-de ense. The jury was out on hour.
The particulars of this trager lay will be well remembered.
It was the culmination of a conflict at Roswell between the law-enforcement forces on the one hand and the defiers of law decency and good government on the other.
After the killing of Woofter a few more prominent citizens deserted the advocacy of a wide-open town for Roswell, but the issue is not settled there yet.
The verdict of this Eddy ounty jury in the Lynch case will aid some in stopping the brazenness of open law viola tions at Roswell as well as elsewhere in this district.
