### **BURSUM BEFUDDLED**

He Comes to Artesia Amid the **Blare of the Trumpets and Goes** Away With the Toot of the Automobile Horn as the Best of the Program.

Mr, H. O. Bursum the republican nominee for governor of New Mexico, arrived in Artesia Wednesday evening behind schedule time. He was accompanied by Mr. Frank W. Clancy republican nominee for attorney general; Ex-Gov. Geo. Curry nominee for congress of the same party, and Senor Jose Sena clerk of the Territorial Supreme court.

The local republicans had out the Adams band which discoursed enjoyable several pieces of music.

The band stand had been decorated for the place of speaking, but owing to the warmth of the sun, a change was made to the intersection of streets by Mann's drug store and an automobile used as a place from which to epeak.

LYNCH IS TO HANG

Motion for a New Trial is Overruled and Only Executive Clemency Can Save Him From the Gallows.

Jim Lynch has been denied a new hearing, as the motion of his attorneys was overruled by Judge Clarence J. Roberts the special trial judge, at Carlsbad. That means, without executive clemency, that Lynch will hang for the killing of City Marshal Woofter at Roswell.

The whole tragedy has its pathetic side lights. It portrays in its many phases, the old law of the protection to your home and the keeping inviolate its sanctity from any kind of interference-legally or otherwise.

On the other hand, there is the majesty of the law of the land, that says no man shall use this guaranteed sanctity of the home as a blind for the violation of the law.







In my opinion, there are three things of the bad conditions prevalent here than the boll-weevil. They are first, the credit system, that staked all on the hazard of the seasons and the fluc- crop. tuation of the cotton market; second, a dependence on cotton not only as a money crop, but also to buy practically everything used on the farm; third, the labor that produced the cotton was entirely beyond the control of the owner of the land.
